

TURF NOTES.

Review of the Blood-Horse Racing on Saturday.

Will Rinfax Win the Pacific Derby—A New Racing Association Organized at Oakland—The Pool-Rooms.

After lying dormant for a year, the old understanding between the clerk of the weather and the blood-horse racing association seems to have come to life again. Blows have not actually been exchanged between them, and the association was able to hold its opening day on the date set, but the weather insisted that such an extent that it was in a most unsatisfactory condition. The blood-horse directors should at once accede to the clerk's demands, however extravagant, unless they wish to possibly pull out the entire bottom of the water reservoir and wash the Bay District race course away.

With but few exceptions the horses that raced last Saturday need considerable more to put them in proper trim. Had Ludovic, in the Tidal stakes, been a little further along in condition, he might possibly have defeated Rinfax. As it was he made good race, though Rinfax had him safe all the way up the stretch. Tricon does not seem to be the Tyeon of last year, though his race at San Jose should have limited him up enough to have made a better showing. Prince's First has filled out finely, and is now in great order. He looks considerably like C. H. Todd and certainly will be. If the weather will only clear up and stay so the Bay District Track should be in good running shape to-morrow. A number of Saturday's runners are lined up in a very different shape on a dry course.

TUESDAY'S DERBY. Tomorrow's programme has on it for the last race the Pacific Derby. Out of the thirty-one entries some are considered prospects. The purse for the Derby will be about \$2000. Whether Rinfax will like the extra quarter mile or not is yet an unsettled question. He was won by him with the Shilpee colt, Ludovic, close up. Black Bart of the Winters' stable was the favorite, but he was not in training and he went wrong in training and is announced as a non-starter.

THE "BOOKIES" AND THE RACES. Betting was not heavy on Saturday's events, and the "bookies" did not have more business than they could comfortably handle. They lost a good deal of money, in fact, in one or two of the favorites. Prince's First and Ludovic were the winners on the third race, when Manie C. a "write-up-own-ticket" shot, ran away from her betters. Ludovic was on the fourth race they also did well, and what they lost on Sheridan was more than made up by the money they won on John Treat. They held out Rine for the last race, and offered high prices against Ludovic and Ludovic's victory was clear gain to them.

It is believed that the ordinance is a "write-up-own-ticket" which will be introduced if the first one is decided to be illegal on the grounds of its conflicting with the ordinance in pool-rooms and betting on the track.
