HEAVY GUN PRACTICE

Promotions and Changes in Army Circles.

Escape of a Military Prisoner—A New Tennis Court—Orders in Honor of Ex-Vice-President Hamlin.

The heavy detonations and the following reverberations which have rolled along the hills bordering the bay, and which have started residents in the Western Addition and the city, are now understood to be the annual practice with the 15-inch gun at Fort Point.

The United States harbors have been mapped out by the army officials in squares 100 yards each way. The distance of every gun defending a harbor from the center of a square and the angle at which it bears on the same point are carefully tabulated.

SCIENCE OF GUNNING.

In the firing practice the gun is trained on the center of a particular square. Observers take the angles from either end of a base line to the point at which the projectile is fired. These are worked up, the exact point at which the projectile impinged calculated, the barometric readings are read off and the reason for any error calculated and corrected.

All this takes time, and as the prevailing climatic conditions are so unfavorable to practice, except in the mornings, the firing is necessarily spread over several days.

Only two ranges of about 1700 yards and the other of 2000 yards. At the conclusion of the practice with the 15-inch gun, the 8-inch rifle which is mounted at the terminus of the Union-street extension, will be commenced.

THE SEAL FISHERIES.

Preparing Technical Information for Early Arbitration.

United States Commissioners Sail for Alaska, Where They Will Act in Conjunction With the British Commission.

The United States steamer Albatross sailed for Alaska at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon, having on board Commissioners Thomas Meadenhall and G. Hart Merriam.

In order that the Government may be prepared with all necessary technical information respecting the actual state of the Behring Sea seal fisheries in the probable

event of early arbitration of the United States' rights in those waters, the President decided to send two expeditions to Alaska to gather the necessary information.

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FOREIGN MISSIONS.

An Address by Dr. Peck at the Central Methodist Church.
