Laying the Corner-Stone of the Church of the Advent.

A Once Fashionable Pastorate Finally Abandoned by the Episcopal Church for Fresh Fields and Pastures New.

The last act in the virtual abandonment of Kinnon Hill and vicinity as a field of enterprise for the Protestant Episcopal Church of America was performed yesterday in the laying of the corner-stone of the new Church of the Advent at Eleventh and Market streets.

The old Church Hall has gone thitherward, the Episcopal Church has followed. It is a plain case of cause and effect. The church, like the schools, the libraries and the judicial tribunals, must follow the law of gravitation as represented by population.

Just about the hour of a 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon the residents and casual wayfarers in the neighborhood of Kinnon Hill, Market street, witnessed the assembling of a small crowd, which grew larger by degrees and beautifully larger in the next ten minutes.

There was an extemporized platform on the street with a parlor organ on it and room for about fifty persons. Close by the corner-stone of the new church swung from its supports. It was inscribed thus:

TO THE GLORY OF GOD AND THE SALVATION OF MEN.

PERFECT AND ETERNAL REST.

Four o'clock had been announced as the hour for the laying of the stone, and only a few minutes later the surplized Advent chorists appeared in sight a block away, and marched in procession up the sidewalk, followed by the Episcopal clergy, the Wardens of the church and representative church members.
