

EGAN'S GUESTS.

The Refugees at the American Legation.

They Are Proving to Be a Source of Much Annoyance.

Mont's Cabinet Completed—Trouble With the United States the First Issue—The New Monitor Mianthomah.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 30.—The fact was developed at yesterday's Cabinet meeting that the refugees at the American Legation in Santiago are proving a great source of embarrassment to the Administration. In the event of hostilities between the United States and Chile, it would be impossible for the Government to afford them any further protection. In the event of war Egan would give his passports and permitted to leave the country in safety, but not the refugees. It seems, too, the refugees are proving themselves a white elephant on Egan's hands. They insist upon being entertained in the most hospitable manner, and seem to feel their right to the best which the Legation affords unquestioned.

THE MONITOR MIANTHOMAH.

NEW YORK, Dec. 30.—The crew of the double-turreted monitor Mianthomah have been busy for two days fitting the bunkers with coal, preparatory to a test of the ten-inch guns and the hydraulic machinery of the turret. The test will be made today. It consists of fifty charges of powder and fifty rounds of shells. The repairs and alterations on the vessel have been finished on New Year's day the ship will start out on a brief cruise to test the newly mounted guns.

The test of the new billiard engines began last night and will be continued for eight hours. The test is perfectly satisfactory so far. Her guns are viewed with the liveliest interest by naval experts and scientific men. Besides four ten-inch breech-loading rifles, two 3-pounder Hotchkiss rapid-firing guns and two 37-millimeter Hotchkiss revolving cannon, the vessel has the very newest thing in naval ordnance—a 6-pounder Driggs-Schroeder rapid-firing gun. This gun has never before been tried on a United States vessel. The gun has a range of 1,000 yards and will shell a vessel at a distance of 2,500 yards with the greatest accuracy, and they can be used at 700 or 800 yards. When the tests are over it is expected the Mianthomah will be sent to the coast of Chile to take a low-water submerged hull, which is a match for any but the largest European battleships.

ALL EUROPE SUFFERS.

The Influenza Becomes an Epidemic on the Continent.

LONDON, Dec. 30.—The influenza epidemic in the western part of the country of Kent is spreading with great rapidity. In the towns of the county, the authorities are attempting to stamp out the disease by the rigorous application of laws pertaining to the health of the population. A person suffering with the contagious disease is visited by medical officers. It is generally conceded by public authorities that the influenza is a contagious epidemic, and consequently a number of persons suffering from that malady and who frequented public places were charged with violating the health laws. In the county of Kent, the disease has spread to the extent of 100,000 cases, and each day 25,000 are believed to be the first instance, in England at least, of persons suffering from influenza being fined for endangering the public by coming in contact with the general public.

PARIS, Dec. 30.—The Turkish Grand Vizier has asked the Minister of Foreign Affairs to review relations with Bulgaria. The Grand Vizier says that the Turkish Government will pledge itself to the maintenance of the status quo in Bulgaria, but that it is necessary to have a representative of the country conferred before further action is taken.

TERRIBLE RAILROAD ACCIDENT.

PARIS, Dec. 30.—A dispatch from St. Petersburg says: A terrible railroad accident occurred yesterday near Rosova on the railway between Moscow and St. Petersburg. An express train ran into the rear of a train carrying troops. Twenty persons were killed and many injured. MOVEMENT OF PASSENGER TRAINS INTERRUPTED ON RAILROADS IN NEW MEXICO.

ALBUQUERQUE (N. Mex.), Dec. 30.—Both the Santa Fe and Atlantic and Pacific roads are troubled with serious snow blockades. No Eastern mails have been received here over the Santa Fe route for four days. Passenger trains are blocked in the Raton Mountains that intersect the railway. There is a blockade on the Atlantic and Pacific between Grants and Chavez, about one hundred miles. The mountain ranges and storms in the mountains are reported to be something unheard of for several years and stories great suffering among the towns in the mountains are in circulation.
