BOSSISM DENOUNCED.

Last Night's Meeting of the Republican County Committee.

A Declaration Adopted Denouncing the Kelly-Crimmins People as Enemies of the Party. The Republican County Committee met last evening at Pioneer Hall, A. Ruef presiding.

Whereas, It is desirable that the books and papers of the Kelly-Crimmins faction be under immediate control, and whereas Mr. George W. Lee, secretary of the committee, has failed to appear at the meeting, and in due form notified the committee.

Resolved, That the secretary do take and be legally instructed to demand and procure from the Kelly-Crimmins faction, in his possession or under his control in any way, all the books, papers, and correspondence of the San Francisco County Committee of 1891-92.

The events which have led the minority of the 60 members of the committee to assume that position in the San Francisco County Committee of San Francisco, require that a plain declaration be made of the causes which have led to the formation of the committee.
