Mexican Troops Murder Villagers in Cold Blood.

SLAUGHTER IN A CHURCH SANCTUARY.

Annihilation of the village, and when the people were notified they answered, "God is with us and we will not be taken." The soldiers left Chihuahua two weeks ago and forward a bunch with others from Pinos Altos and Guerrero to the number of 1500. Monday the attack was made. The Temochians, with their families, took refuge in the church awaiting the attack. It was made on all sides and the slaughter was terrible. At dusk the soldiers came to the church and a terrible hand to hand fight took place. The soldiers completed the massacre with 208 of their number killed and many wounded. The village next day presented a terrible view. The streets leading to the church were filled with bodies and blood seemed to flow in torrents. Not a man of the Temochians was left except those who happened to be out in the mountains. But the Government has paid dearly for its victory. The Temochians were some time ago a very wealthy people in cattle and farms, but lack of rain and the failure of their crops had brought them to poverty, and they were unable to exist under the extortion of the Government and its petty officials, and were brought near to starvation. They were very hospitable, and several weeks ago when several parties of Americans passed through from Guerrero to Chihuahua they were treated kindly and well cared for, though the Government officials objected to their going, they saying the Temochians were bad. The feeling against the Government is very strong, and has been called a second Alamo, which will bring light and liberty to the Mexican people, as it did to those of Texas.

Escapes of the Notorious Duellist. Woe Recently Died. LONDON, Oct. 27.—By the death of Harry Vane Milbank, the eldest son of Sir Frederick Aclom Milbank, the succession of the baronetcy falls to Powlett Milbank, the second son. He does not resemble his dead brother in any way. As evidence of this, Powlett has agreed to contest the Parliamentary district of Radnor in the Conservative interest at the next election. Harry Milbank had no liking for any occupation that would take him from a single moment from what he called the pleasures of life. His death has recalled many stories of his career as an ardent duellist. He hid from the public the knowledge of his early association with the notorious Mabel Gray, and never said much about his marriage to Alice, the widow of Edward Belcher. But he had been known to admit facts about his famous duels with the husband of the lady, her brother and her brother-in-law, all of whom fell victims to his deadly weapon. It was his marriage to Madam Belcher, and not his other failings, that caused the late Duke of Cleveland to disinherit him.
