STRIKING OUT. Oakland Citizens Are Awake. NO BOSSES, NO RINGS. The Municipal League's Big Meeting. A CONVENTION IS CALLED.

The City of Homes Not to Be Ruled by the Bookie Tricksters Any Longer. Nearly a hundred of Oakland's best citizens gathered in Fraternal Hall, Washington street, last night. They were members of what is known as the Municipal League.

Considerable excitement was caused by a shooting affray which occurred at the corner of California and Montgomery streets shortly after 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon, when James Fogarty was seriously wounded by George H. Lent, a prominent young man in this city, and then sent a bullet into his own brain.

Mr. Fogarty, who is the cashier of O'Farrell & Co., the real estate agent on Montgomery street, left his office shortly before shooting in company with a friend, and the couple sauntered leisurely down Montgomery street toward California, where he was standing at the corner.

Several plans were discussed, but they all were rejected, and it was decided to hold a convention at an early date. The convention is to be composed of fifty delegates, three from each ward and twenty at large.

The standing committee was instructed to prepare a list of delegates and to present it to the league on December 15, when another election will be held. The date for the convention will be decided on at that meeting.

OUT OF THE SKY. A Meteor Falls to Earth in This City. CARMEN SEE IT STRIKE. Pieces Found by Assistant Superintendent Jewett and Sent to the Academy of Sciences.

A hissing in the air followed by a flash of light was what Conductor Jackson Malone first noticed when he saw a meteor passing the corner of Jackson and Scott streets about 10 o'clock Sunday night. The storm was raging at the time and both men were paying close attention to the car and looking out for obstructions, but the sudden hissing and flash of light made them look up for a moment and they saw a lurid ball of fire fall from the sky and bury itself in the ground thirty feet from the car.

Two inches deep where the meteor struck, and the rest of the surface is blackened to its core. All around the hole are particles broken off from the main piece which tally exactly with the pieces that Jewett picked up. So there is no doubt that what the carmen saw is true.
