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AGAINST ADOPTION The Report on the Leeds Amendment.

READY FOR THE SENATE. As Was Expected, the Committee Is Opposed to the Abolition of the Railroad Commission.

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SACRAMENTO, Feb. 22.—Immediately upon the convening of the Senate tomorrow morning Senator Earl, chairman of the committee on Constitutional Amendments, will recite a report on the Leeds amendment, which has been in the hands of that committee since early in the session.

The proposed amendment strikes from the present constitution those provisions establishing a Railroad Commission, and proposes as a substitute in lieu thereof the Legislature as before the adoption of the new constitution, save and except that a limitation be placed on the power of the commission to fix rates.

After commenting on the character of testimony taken the report says that it would not be wise to confer upon the Legislature the duty of fixing railroad rates. It would be a constant source of contention, it says, at every session and with the constitutional limit of sixty days the Legislature would have little time for the consideration of any subject.

After the address the choir sang "Rest, Spirit, Rest," and a benediction closed the ceremonies.

After dinner they adjourned to the upper deck and sang all the college songs they could think of. The night was beautiful, and they stayed outside until a late hour.

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HE LOST CONTROL. A Tragedy of Eastern Winter. TRAINS CRASH TOGETHER. The Rails Were Slippery and the Engineer Could Not Slacken His Speed.

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PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 22.—A terrible wreck occurred at South-street station, at 10:30 o'clock this morning. The limited special from Washington on the Pennsylvania road, bound for New York City, collided with the Westchester accommodation.

The Washington special was in two sections. On the first were a number of Senators, Representatives and department officials.

The rumor quickly spread that it was President Harrison's special; but this proved untrue as his special had already passed on its way to New York.

The accident was due to the slippery condition of the track making it impossible for the engineer of the express to control the train. Four men were killed and ten injured, none dangerously.

Several other names were to-night added to the list of injured, but their names are not known. It is reported that the bodies were laid out on cushions and covered for protection against the falling snow.
