MRS. WILKIE INJURED.

She Fell at the Potrero and Hurl Her

Mrs. Wilkie, the wife of Alfred Wilkie, the engineer, met with a serious accident on last Tuesday. It happened at the Potrero, where she had gone with Alfred Wilkie Jr., a youth about 10 years of age, who was particularly anxious to witness the launch of the Oregon.

The mother and son stationed themselves on some scaffolding near the water where a number of other spectators had also obtained places. As the Oregon struck the water of the bay a miniature tidal wave was formed, which surged over the scaffolding and struck the people occupying it to make a sudden rush for terra firma. In the confusion Mrs. Wilkie, who had caught the heel of her shoe in a crack between the boards, was thrown in the water and injured.

Several kindly disposed persons immediately tendered their assistance, including J. J. Glynn and David Neal. Officer Eastman was about to ring up a private ambulance to take Mrs. Wilkie to the hospital, but Alfred Wilkie Jr. emphatically protested against seeing his mother enter such a vehicle under any circumstances.

The cable was stopped. The Castro-street cable line was shut down for the entire evening from 5:35 o'clock last night owing to the packing of wire and the broken cable was unsuccessful, and the cars were run two together and left in charge of the employees for the night. It was found necessary to stop the cable from the power-house at the junction of Market and Valencia streets to the end of the Castro-street line at Twenty-sixth street. Travel was entirely suspended, and the passengers at the extreme southwestern portion of the Mission along Castro Heights and in Noe Valley were compelled to walk two miles over hill and dale to reach their firesides.
