MAKING PROGRESS.

The Women's Reform of the City Press. MEN ARE ANXIOUS TO ASSIST.

A most enthusiastic meeting of ladies interested in raising the moral tone of our city papers took place at Miss West's school on Van Ness avenue yesterday afternoon.

The committees of those ladies who had attended the churches here and in Oakland tendered their reports and letters were read from ladies working for the cause all over the State.

A lady who had been securing signatures in one of our city churches stated that two or three men had insisted on signing. "I told them it was only a woman's movement, but as they persisted in writing their names beside those of their wives and daughters I permitted them to have their way and erased their signatures afterward."

Another lady stated that in one of the Oakland churches two or three young men had urged, "Why have you not allowed men to participate in this movement? It is one in which men and women are interested."

The ladies seemed unanimous in their opinion that the women of California were getting up this protest, said the speaker, in a paper called "The Outlook." The editorial in question commented on this remark, and ended with the conclusion that it was "none too strong."

The question of the mass-meeting was voted upon and it was unanimously decided to hold it next Monday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock.

After reading the report of the Outlook from all the large towns throughout the State, it was decided to elect a committee of 100 vice-presidents to assist in further spreading the petitions.
