ELECTRIC LIGHTS PLACED.

Mammoth Asphalt Block for the Mining Section.

BOILERS IN MACHINERY HALL.

A Meeting of Citizens To-Morrow Night to Prepare Programmes for the Various Congresses.

Still another building is to be added to the architectural group at Sunset City.

The additional structure is to be used as an emergency hospital and as headquarters for the emergency and ambulance corps.

The San Francisco Polyclinic volunteered a few days ago to take charge of this incidental branch of the exposition service and the offer was accepted by the management.

To carry out the plans in connection with this department a building is necessary. Friends of the polyclinic have com-

might be expected from the observations, conclusions and description of a fiery man. But the ground traveled was not an untrodden way, though there were novel touches which were interesting to the general public.

The hospital will be in the form of a cross, and the red cross will form a prominent part in its exterior decoration.

Preparations for the electric lighting in the exhibition buildings and in about the grounds are being hurried forward to-day.

Poles for the 120-amp lights which are to illuminate the grounds and the work of erecting them began yesterday.

Wiring for the exterior illumination of the Mechanical Arts building with incandescent lamps has been completed and the workmen are engaged in similar work on Horticultural Hall.

The wiring of the interior of the Administration building has been finished, leaving only the Manufacturers' structure to be similarly equipped.

A busy scene was observable in the rear of the Mechanical Arts building yesterday in connection with the placing in position of the big boilers.

The boilers were conveyed to their position by the special track laid for that purpose.

After the boilers have been firmly located the annex will be built over them.

The engine donated by the Golden Gate Mining Company also arrived at Sunset City yesterday and will be put in its permanent position.

Additional designs for representing California's total gold product are being prepared.

One will consist of a golden sphere twenty feet in diameter surrounded by a band all supported on golden columns.

There will be a large cube suspended from the ceiling, an immense ingot, and one in the form of a mammoth coin.

A replica of the Marshall silver mine will go into the El Dorado County exhibit.

Most of Santa Barbara's space in the mining exhibit will be occupied by the California Petroleum and Asphalt Company.

A solid block of asphalt weighing several tons has been quarried and will be displayed as the largest block of asphalt in the world.

Inyo County's display will include silver lead ores, soda from Owens Lake, brine from Saline Valley and specimens of marbles and onyx.

A working model of a placer mine in full operation will be exhibited by W. G. Fee of Spokane.

It will represent a complete set of flumes, reservoirs, sluice-boxes and water forces, and will be an interesting feature.

The Siskiyou Mill and Lumber Company has turned out the largest sugar-ore board ever cut in that county for exhibition at the fair.

The board is 1 1/2 inches thick, 54 inches wide and 16 feet long and is without a knot or flaw.
