

AN ANGRY WOMAN.

How Thurston Regards the Ex-Queen.

NOBODY FEARS HER NOW.

Restoration Is a Thing Utterly Out of the Question.

PROVISIONALS VERY HOSTILE.

Dole Prepared to Fight Anybody Who Tries to Displace the Present Government.

OMAHA, Jan. 18.—The Hawaiian Minister at Washington, Lorin A. Thurston, went through Omaha this evening en route to Washington. To an Associated Press reporter Minister Thurston said the members of his Government were not alarmed at the threats of Liliuokalani, as she was powerless and her talk was treated as the utterance of an angry woman. Her threats, however, lost her all the allegiance of many loyal men who denounce the Queen for rejecting the proposition to grant amnesty in case she is restored. She cannot be restored except by force and there is little probability of that. The talk of securing an army in Canada be treated as a good joke.

"I know nothing of a protectorate being established," Thurston said. "The present Government is able to take care of the state. I do not anticipate any trouble with the United States. The question of annexation is lost sight of in the restoration policy, but it will come up again. In the islands the feeling is as strong as ever in favor of annexation. In fact, among the natives, it is growing. I go direct to Washington to resume my official position."

Wm. Waterhouse of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, a brother of Henry Waterhouse of the Provisional Government, who returned from Honolulu with Minister Thurston, talked freely on the situation in the islands at the time of his departure, and according to Waterhouse the spirit of the Provisional Government is one of defiance to the United States in particular and to all Governments in general. He says all arrangements had been made to fire on the American flag.

"The greatest excitement prevailed in Honolulu," said Waterhouse, "when the Corwin arrived, and it seemed as if a revolution would be undertaken. The Provisional Government was ready to resist by force, and there is no question that there would have been a conflict if any attempt had been made to land Marines. The animosity is not confined to the United States Government, but extends to any Government that expects to undertake restoration. Dole is fixed to fight to a finish for what he now holds. Minister Willis has not been given his papers, but the impression in the islands is that he will ask for them soon. He is ostracized and generally disliked, the sentiment among the white inhabitants amounting to almost a boycott. His wife is included in the feeling by the ladies of the island. This action is explained on the ground that when Blount was in the islands he was invited to Secretary Phillips' home and then asked questions and made use of the answers. It is not intended that persons in Honolulu shall again be subjected to this sort of thing on the part of any American connected with the Cleveland administration."

Waterhouse further says that if any attempt had been made to restore the Queen she would have been assassinated. "This is the fate," he said, "that awaits her, and she knows it, though it is not given official recognition."

NEW YORK, Jan. 18.—The Post's Washington special says: There is no truth in the report that the Hawaiian Government has demanded the recall of Minister Willis. It can be stated upon authority that nothing of the sort has been even hinted at in official communications between the two Governments.

STEVENS ON HAND.

Ready to Testify Before the Senate Committee. WASHINGTON, Jan. 18.—Hon. John L. Stevens of Maine, ex-Minister to Hawaii, is here to testify before the Senate committee. Stevens thinks that the last disclosures of the Hawaiian diplomatic correspondence go far to establish the correctness of the Republican position on the question. Stevens will remain in Washington until Monday, and is prepared to give the Senate committee a report of the Hawaiian revolution, if desired to point to the broader question of annexation.

THAT CANADIAN ARMY.

Relied Upon to Effect the Restoration of the Queen. VICTORIA, B. C., Jan. 18.—A story has been set afloat to the effect that an agent of the deposed Hawaiian Queen has been in Canada for some time, securing a little army for Honolulu. It is said that 150 members of the Northwest mounted police force have enlisted. It is further asserted the recruiting officer of the Queen is C. W. H. Samson, a prominent business man at Vancouver. The alleged army will, according to the story, be in charge of Captain McKean, an ex-sergeant of the mounted police. It is said the Australian steamer Warrimoo bore to the Honolulu royalists when it sailed last night a report of the progress of the recruiting officer and an appeal for further instructions.

DIED IN THE STORM. A Sonora Man Is Found Frozen in His Wagon. SONORA, Jan. 18.—Timothy C. Dunton, aged 60, left Sonora yesterday afternoon for his home, some ten miles above this place. His frozen body was found this morning in the bottom of his wagon about three miles from Sonora. His horse remained standing in the road all night amid a fearful storm of rain and snow. It is surmised that Dunton was the worse for whiskey, fell from the seat of the wagon and froze to death.

Acquitted On One Charge. CHEYENNE, Wyo., Jan. 18.—In the United States court today William M. Masl, late Postmaster of this city, was acquitted of the charge of embezzlement of funds. He will be tried to-morrow on a charge of embezzling a registered letter containing \$350.

THE PROVINCIAL PARLIAMENT. Various Matters Presented to British Columbian Legislators. VICTORIA, B. C., Jan. 18.—The Provincial Parliament opened today. The Premier's speech promises a redistribution bill, which has been delayed by the imperfect census returns, speaks of the railway and mining development,

the increased output of coal, salmon and agricultural and horticultural products. It refers to coming actions before the Supreme Court as to jurisdiction of the Dominion Government over fishing in provincial waters.
