Miss Sorabji Deprecates Inhospitality.

In a Lecture at the Pleasanton She Explains the Noble Object of Her Mission.

"Since I have come to California I have heard many uncomplimentary things which have put me to a stop at once. A California woman asked, 'Is that lady who she claims to be?' I claim to be nothing in my country hospital but in this country I am a nurse and a lecturer."

These words were spoken by Miss Jeanne Sorabji, otherwise known as Princess Sorabji, in her introduction to a lecture at the Pleasanton Hotel Tuesday evening. There was a large and fashionable attendance, which before Miss Sorabji began to speak was quite entirely entertained by Mrs. Lottie C. Ballantine in an address on "Manners and Customs in India," and by Al Foster in Irish character sketches and comic dialogues.

Miss Sorabji, besides emphatically inveighing against the implied inhumanity of untrained nurses, and the ill-effects of the fact that she was a Princess, in her low, rich, distinct tones she explained that the uncomplimentary things she had been asked to her name in Chicago. She said she boasted as blue blood as any of Chicago's four hundred, but as the daughter of a Prince thought to be a Princess, she could not grasp the fact that she could not belong to the ruling race of India. She thanked every one who had shown her any attention.

Miss Sorabji presented a striking figure as she stood on a dais in one corner of the parlor, wearing a black and white dress, which was relieved by red, gold-spangled drapery, one end of which was thrown over her shoulder, crossing a black bolice, which was distinguished by a corsage-bouquet of La France roses. In her hair nestled some gold ornaments, and she wore a necklace of pearls and diamonds. Her dress was simple and effective, and she wore a black and white dress.

She told how she had come to the United States to raise \$25,000 to benefit her helpless country women, and meant to raise it, with the divine help, she told of the practice toward America felt by the Indian widows rescued by the Punjab Kamath, and then she spoke of the great trouble which she had had in her life to overcome the obstacles in the way of education to enlighten her down-trodden sex in India.

"The star of India is rising," she predicted, "and it will bring the extinction of all Indian men, but Indian women."

Then Miss Sorabji told of her father, who was one of the three great kings of India, and of the Indian kings. Her mother's fame as a helper of women was such that a letter addressed to her would be answered by her.

Finally after singing "Lay Your Head on My Shoulder" in pure, rich tones the princess announced that she would be in the city at the Young Men's Christian Association Hall, and the entertainment was over.

WORK FOR THE IDLE.

A Claim That the Government Should Provide It.

The auditorium of the First Baptist Church was filled Tuesday night when T. V.
