

IRELAND'S DAY.

Committees Meet With Great Success.

MONEY GENEROUSLY GIVEN.

Final Meeting of the General Organization.

GREAT PROCESSION GUARANTEED

Arrangements Almost Completed for Erin's Grand Celebration to Her Patron Saint.

Enthusiasm marked the final meeting last night of the general St. Patrick's day celebration committee, and the room in the Flood building was crowded with patriotic men eager to do proper honor to Erin's great day. The reports of the various committees all dwell on the singular success met with, and some of the committees could not refrain from commenting at length on the more than usually strong desire on the part of their countrymen to make the event a credit to all concerned.

Indeed, in the words of T. R. Bannerman, "There never was such an eagerness and generosity met with before." E. J. Tobin presided. J. C. Nealon, chairman of the finance committee, reported that their efforts had met with great results. All the necessary funds, he said, would be forthcoming. So far \$3800 had been subscribed, and there was no doubt that, so far as the financial part is concerned, there will be more than enough money to put on the parade.

Secretary W. F. Stafford reported on behalf of the executive committee that they had visited the director-general, and he had promised to send ticket-peddlers down to Van Ness avenue, in order to sell to the members in parade at that point. At the fair grounds in passing in four abreast the paraders will hand their tickets to collectors placed on each side of the gates.

Secretary Stafford further stated that the parade would start from Van Ness avenue at 11 A. M., pontifical high mass to be celebrated at the cathedral at 9 o'clock. He reported further that \$450 had been set aside for bands, but so far no arrangements had been made for floats.

Dr. O'Toole, T. Mahoney, Colonel Barry and the others of the entertainment committee, he said, had raised so far \$270 for the entertainment of the guests of the day, among the invited being President Harrison, Governor Fuller of Vermont, General Alger of Michigan, Senator Sawyer and other notabilities. Expenses will be very great, and some \$150 more will be needed.

J. J. Kenny reported that the parishes of St. Peter, St. Paul, St. James and St. Charles would send many of their parishioners to march in the parade. He requested a band to head the detachment. He was referred to the committee on music.

A communication was read from the Regular Army and Navy Union Garrison No. 101, stating that 100 members would take part in the procession.

On motion of J. J. Kenny, the finance committee was instructed to apply any money they had in surplus to more bands.

T. R. Bannerman reported that 167 aids had been found so far, each of whom could provide his own accoutrements and horse. Altogether there will be 200 aids, "I think a great deal of credit is due to Mr. Bannerman," said President Tobin, and a volley of applause saluted the remark.

Then R. C. O'Connor, on the committee for games, reported that medals will be allowed for winners in the various games. All the games are open to all amateurs, except four, two of these being for the National Guard. He said he had no doubt there were good runners in the National Guard.

"I beg your pardon," said Major Delaney, "members of the National Guard, sir, never run." "Good for you, Delaney," said the committee. "It's easy enough to say they don't run," put in Secretary Stafford, "when they're never had a chance."

A burst of laughter greeted the sally and then J. Mahoney of the entertainment committee went on to report that there would be sixty guests of the day. One hundred enlisted men of the United States army would also have to be provided for. He was left to the entertainment committee to decide whether a banquet or a cold luncheon should be provided for the guests. Dr. O'Toole thought that two bottles of champagne should be allowed to each distinguished guest.

In the matter of historic floats Mr. Bannerman reported he could get up five for \$250.

COLLEGIANS CELEBRATE.

The junior collegians of the Sacred Heart College gave a splendid literary and musical entertainment last evening in the college hall in honor of St. Patrick's day. As an artistic effort for boys the programme rendered, was eminently successful. It was highly appreciated by the audience, which numbered fully 2000 persons.

The hall was decorated with shields, flags and green banners appropriate to the occasion, while the stage was set with a Venetian scene bordered by deep green woods. It is customary for the junior

class to celebrate the Irish national holiday, and their seniors always commemorate Washington's birthday in a similar manner.

After an overture by the college orchestra under Brother Rose's direction last evening Evans Morgan, a bright junior class man, delivered a clever little address. He said: "In compliance with a time-honored and revered custom we have met to do honor to the patron saint of our ancestors. Owing to circumstances we have anticipated the precise day of this feast, but now as then I am sure our tributes of devotion will be no less acceptable to him, nor will our remembrances be less dear to our brethren beyond the seas. This festive day of March has a peculiar significance—it is religious and national. How to separate the two in the Irish race I know not. Throughout the ages so identified have the Irish people been in their laws and customs with their religion, or rather their customs and laws have been so thoroughly imbued and vivified by their religion, they cannot be considered apart. Priest and poet, peer and peasant, have stood side by side under the shadow of the cross. Let us hope that a brighter day is about to dawn. Let us hope that the same kindly light that led the children of Israel through the barren wastes of the Eastern desert will not be hidden from a race that has clung to the right with a loyalty no misfortune could dismay, a heroism that commands the admiration of the world."
