The Progress of the Black Plague.

WHITES AMONG THE VICTIMS

Food for the Disease in Fifth at Hong-Kong.

SAD PREDICAMENT OF THE PERU.

Officials Fail to Take Proper Precautions and a Fearful Death Rate Follows.

VICTORIA, B. C., June 23.—The steamer Sikh, thirteen days from Yokohama, has arrived, and had a long process of quarantine inspection.

The Peruvian steamer from Hong-Kong died on board en route from Hong-Kong she was detained at Nagasaki for inspection.

Had the Hong-Kong officials taken the slightest precautions to prevent the plague from entering the colony or to isolate the first few cases which occurred it would have saved much mortality.

A British officer and three men are reported as attacked by the plague. The authorities believe they have not got a grip on the plague.

According to a Kobe paper, although there had been signs of the plague diminishing, thirty new cases were reported and twenty-five deaths occurred on May 23.

Special precautions for examining the Sikh were taken as a result of the correspondence between the Mayor and the Otaawa Government.

HIS PET SCHEME.

Reilly and the Pacific Roads.

HE EXPOSED THE JOKER.

Congressman Maguire Would Not Stand It.

IN FACT IT MADE HIM LAUGH.

Opponents of the Funding Bill Not to Be Caught by Any Such Chaff.

WASHINGTON, June 23.—Chairman Reilly has proposed seriously to Representative Maguire that he assent to certain modifications in the funding bill for the Central Pacific Railroad that are little less than absurd.

The transparency of this scheme is so apparent that Maguire laughed at it. In few words he showed Reilly that if the Government refunded the debt and thereby disposed of the original contract under which the suits are to be brought by substituting another contract then there would be no ground for the Government to bring any suits.

The Maguire resolution suspending the granting of patents to purchasers of lands ceded by the Government to the Pacific railroads has raised a point which has become the subject of inquiry on the part of the sub-committee of the House Committee on Pacific Railroads.

It appears that many acres have been purchased from the Central Pacific road on the installment plan, and that buyers have refused to pay local taxes on the same on the ground that they are not liable until all their installments have been paid and the patent to the lands has been handed over by the Government.

The sub-committee will endeavor to draft an amendment to the resolution making it a condition of payment to provide for such cases without causing loss to purchasers.
