vertise \$2.00 worth of sugar for \$1.00 combined with a dozen or twenty articles on which they make a small profit. Possibly upon the whole bill the profit is smaller than a local merchant could afford, and prosper. But it is not only because of the low price that the articles sell for that they succeed but form the simple reason that their price list reaches every farm home in the county and state, in which they seek to do business. It is their method of persistence and extensive advertising that gives them the trade.

There is no patent right on their methods. Let the country merchants get together and agree upon a percent of profit that will meet the catalogue competition. Club together if necessary, buy and ship all goods in car load or train lots. Then go about it in a systematic and intelligent manner and advertise what you have and the bargains you have to offer your community. The people know when you offer them a bargain and you are certain of their trade. Send your advertising matter into every household within your radius, not only once a year but every week of the year and the REPUBLICAN will stake its reputation on your success.

The merchant who plans to pay as much each week for his advertising as he does for his clerks never lacks for customers and has no occasion to complain of the catalogue houses.

### Buff Cochins Chickens.

Mrs. France Moore can justly boast of having the finest Buff Cochins chickens the country affords. For several years she has made a specialty of raising Buff Cochins chickens and improving her flock from year to year.
