THE members of the Korean embassy passed through Omaha, on Saturday.

THE stock of compliments of the Republican and Journal having become so superabundant they are now working off that superfluity by exchanging compliments between themselves.

A TRAIN on the Glens Falls branch of the D. & H. C. Company, went through a bridge over the Glens Falls feeder to the Chapiin canal, near Ft. Edwards, N. Y., Sunday, and all but one person, a newsboy, were either killed or severely injured.

W. NEELSON, attorney for Miss Hill in the charges of adultery preferred by her against Senator Sharon, and which recently were dismissed, has on his own account filed a complaint in the Superior court to recover \$120,000 from Senator Sharon for alleged slander.

P. S. EUSTIS, general ticket agent of the B. & M. railroad, his brother, C. G. Eustis, and J. B. Griffiths, have purchased a tract of land about ten miles north of Red Cloud, containing 1,000 acres, which they intend developing into a first-class stock farm.

ADVICES from Smyrna state that an earthquake, on the 16th, shook the Island of Chios severely, and extended along the entire coast of Anatolia, and far into the interior of Asia Minor. The loss of life was appalling, 1,000 being reported killed. At Smyrna alone were three hundred victims, and unprecedented tide disasters are reported.

LIEUTENANT GARLINGTON, of the Proteus, has made his official report, which not only shows that Capt. Pike accurately described the crew of the Proteus when he said they were "the worst scoundrels he had ever seen," but also indicates that the captain himself was an ignorant and careless navigator. As to his instructions, Lieut. Garlington declares that he received none except those originally given to him, and Gen. Hazen says that the Lieutenant does not deserve censure for any alleged disobedience of orders.

SECRETARY NEWMAN furnishes the following totals on the governorship, as the result of the late election: Foraker, 347,063; Hoadley, 359,593; Schumacher, 8,361; Jenkins, 27,850; total vote, 721,464; Hoadley's majority, 1,383. Majority for the judicial amendment, 33,413. The second amendment fell short of a majority by 38,543. The regulation amendment received 98,050 votes.

THE Chinese are assisting the Black Flag at Annam. Eight Chinese gunboats have arrived at Shanghai. The Portuguese gunboats have withdrawn from the harbor at Hong Kong, taking with them the watchman who drowned the Chinamen and precipitated the recent riots. The French are awaiting reinforcements before hazarding an attack. Such seems to be the state of affairs in China.

THE Gazette-Journal modestly remarks that as Hastings contains more friends, readers and admirers of the blind Grecian poet to the square mile than any other town in Nebraska, the people will be interested in learning that the island of Chios which has just been destroyed by an earthquake in the vicinity of Smyrna Bay is the reputed birth place of Homer.

PATRICK WGAN, the Irish agitator and late treasurer of the Irish land league, has fled his intention of becoming an American citizen. He will locate and engage in the buying of grain in Lincoln. He expects his family here in April or May. He is at present the guest of John Fitzgerald of Lincoln, a prominent and wealthy worker for the cause of the Irish peasantry.

THE postmaster general has decided that foreign letter postage is cut down by the act reducing the rates per half ounce from three to two cents, and hereafter "ship letters" will go across the briar deep for four cents instead of six. At first the department seemed to hold the other way, and detained several hundred letters on which the senders had placed two red stamps instead of the old green ones.

THE recent decision of the Supreme Court of the United States that the civil rights bill was unconstitutional, has called forth a convention of prominent colored men, and their sympathizers. Sunday night, a meeting was held in Washington, at which 2,000 persons were present, and ringing speeches were made by Fred Douglass, "Deacon" Bob Ingersoll and others, the colored man being advised to vote for the party which champions his cause.

THE trustees of the Warren Memorial fund have purchased a handsome villa at Newport for Mrs. Warren, widow of the late General G. K. Warren, U. S. A., on whose behalf an effort was made a year ago, by admirers and friends. It will be grateful news to those who contributed to the testimonial for the widow of one of the bravest of American generals, to know that she will be sheltered from want in her declining days.

THE criminal record and the list of accidents and casualties of the past week have been terribly destructive to life and property. The cowboys of Colorado came in for a full share in the fendish work; two of them killing two Mexicans and two white men, at a dance, firing into the house indiscriminately. Some "gentlemen of color" in Georgia come to the front in the same line of business, while some "respectably connected and well-to-do" farmers of the same state, turn in and send one another home to glory in true southern style.

THE steamer Rio Janeiro, sailing on Wednesday for Hong Kong, will carry away about 1,000 Chinamen and about \$750,000, which they carry off with them out of the country. Over 800 of them have already been provided with return certificates. It has been remarked that a large proportion of returning Chinese now bring women whom they claim as their wives. There being no way to disprove marriage they are permitted to land, and, in a majority of cases, immediately turned loose for immoral purposes.

Read and Consider.

ED. TRIBUNE: In a paragraph in your last week's issue, you say that if any of the candidates on the People's ticket "desire success, they must rustle." Well, now, I ask to be allowed to rustle a little in your columns in behalf of one of the aforesaid candidates.

George A. Hunter of Indianola, is a candidate for the office of County Treasurer, and in my judgment, he has paramount claims to that office which ought not to be ignored by his fellow-citizens. He came here in 1872, one of the advance guard of civilization. He took part in the organization of, and was the first sheriff of Red Willow county. At that time the county had no money whatever, and in the strife which occurred in the fall of 1873, between Red Willow and Indianola, he rendered service as sheriff in various suits for whose costs the county was liable to the amount of at least one hundred dollars, which he could have compelled the county to pay, yet Mr. Hunter made a present of his services for the entire term to the people, and never presented a bill for the same to the county. Now, that was an act which ought to be remembered. What other sheriff would have done that? During the disastrous years of 1876 and 1877, he was treasurer of the county. Tax collecting was odious in these years, and Mr. Hunter probably made some enemies in consequence of the vigorous manner in which he looked after and collected the taxes of absconding delinquents.

He was faithful to his duties, and fearlessly collected the revenues of the county and state. At this time the pay of the office was so small that it was a disadvantage and an incumbrance to hold the office. The office then went begging for an occupant; and now since it has become a source of profit, the people ought to bestow it for one term on the man who had the pluck and patriotism to hold it in the days of the grasshoppers, when nobody wanted it. These facts are not to be denied, and Mr. Hunter's fitness for the office can not be denied. But it is now charged against him that he went before the Republican County Convention, and, having been defeated, bolted the convention. This charge is wholly false. Now, let the facts be submitted to an honest people, and let truth prevail. About two or three weeks before the primaries were held, Mr. Hunter was summoned to the sick and apparently dying bed of a mother and sister in another state. The sister died, the mother recovered. Mr. Hunter, obeying the highest and holiest impulses of man's nature, and heedless of his personal interests, went to the bedside of his sick relatives. While he was absent, the primaries were held, and Mr. Goodrich secured a majority of the delegates.

Mr. Hunter is of the opinion that if he had been here, he would have had a majority, and would have received the nomination. As it was he expressly refused to be a candidate before the convention, and gave notice that he would be an independent candidate. I believe George A. Hunter would have been nominated by the Republican convention, if he had not been called away by the high and solemn duties that a true man owes to the mother who bore him, and because he would not disregard the claims of a mother's love, or a sister's friendship, he ought not to be sacrificed on the altar of these holy duties. Let the voters of Red Willow county consider this matter well, and if they see the claims of Mr. Hunter as I do, let him be made the next Treasurer of Red Willow county.
