THE Hastings Gazette-Journal has been taken in by some re-liable cuss, who gullied it into the belief that our city fathers here, have, for the protection of their sons, raised the saloon license here to \$3,000 per annum. On the contrary, the fee was reduced to \$750, which goes into the school fund, and the saloon men each present the city with \$250, which is to be applied to side walks and other needed improvements; so that virtually the saloon men are no better or worse off than they were before the ordinance was passed.

THE Illinois muddle is at an end. Contrary to the expectations of the newsgatherers of Monday, the republicans of the legislature were all on hand at the joint convention at Springfield on Tuesday noon, and on the second ballot John A. Logan received the vote of a majority of the whole number of members elect, being a quorum, and the dead-lock that has lasted for nearly five months is ended and the republicans have triumphed.

It has been a memorable contest, second only to that in New York in the summer of '81, and the outcome will close up the breach in the party in Illinois instead of serving as an entering wedge for future humiliation and disgrace. The republicans of Nebraska send their congratulations to their brethren in Illinois, and to the veteran soldier and statesman whose services are secured for another term in the national senate by the steadfastness of his friends and the blunders of his opponents.—State Journal.
