In 1884 the family moved to Hayes county, this state, where he homesteaded and lived until 1900, when McCook became their home and where he spent the remainder of his days. Deceased served throughout the war of the rebellion in company F, 25th Iowa regiment. His was an industrious, Christian life.)
