Conducted by County Superintendent Crocker

Supt. W. H. Gardner of Auburn, visited Falls City last Saturday evening and Sunday.

The Falls City Board of Education met last Friday evening and re-elected Supt. Pillsbury for a term of two years with a nine increase in salary.

Miss Eva D. Scott, principal teacher in Barada schools, is still on the sick list and not able to teach. She is improving however, and hopes to resume her work next Monday morning.

Niss Mary Watteyne has been compelled to resign her position as primary teacher in the Preston school on account of poor health. Miss Julia Cronin, who will soon complete the years term in Dist. 25 will finish Miss Watteyne's term.

Prof. A. McMurray, whom most of our teachers know, is head of the English department of the Ott School of Expression, Chicago. The regular spring meeting of the Richardson County Teacher's Association was held in Falls City last Friday evening and Saturday. A prominent feature of the spring session is the inter-high school debate. This was held in the Jenne Opera House, Friday evening. The question was, "Resolved, That the United States is Justified in its Action Toward the Panama Republic."

Speakers on the affirmative were Ethel Kieler, Verdon; Verne R. Taylor, Shubert; Kenneth Heacock, Preston; Miles Crook, Falls City. Negative—Norman J. Sansom, Dawson; Miss Doras Montgomery, Stella; Ira Crook, Salem; Maud Tosland, Humboldt.

This was not an oratorical or a declamatory contest—not a speaking match, but a contest is straight thinking. Each contestant was chosen by a series of local debates. Each speaker did well and this debating work commends itself to all. Each school was represented by a strong delegation, with school colors and

banners waving, and with yells to encourage its contestant. Enthusiasm and interest was great. The opera house was crowded. Total receipts \$72.00 at 15 cents admission, besides several complimentary admissions.

The Saturday sessions were held in the Central school building. The program was carried out as announced.

During the business meeting it was decided to make Falls City the permanent place for holding the meetings. The teachers decided to make The Falls City Tribune the official organ of the county department of education and of the Richardson County teachers association. The Tribune makes a special rate of 75 cents per year to all teachers.

The following resolutions were read and adopted.

The teachers of Richardson county in association assembled submit the following resolutions:

Resolved That we heartily endorse the custom of holding an annual inter-high-school debate.

Resolved, That we extend the thanks of the association to Prof. Hodgman of the State University and to Supt. Anderson of Tecumseh for their services as judges in the inter-high-school debate, also for their helpful remarks during the Saturday morning session.

Resolved, That we endorse the administration of Supt. Crocker in the execution of his duties as superintendent of Richardson County, realizing that the best interests of education in the county can be secured only by a close sympathy between the superintendent and his teachers.

Resolved, That we thank the the people and the teachers of Falls City for the pleasant entertainment of the visiting teachers.

In as much as school athletics is no longer an experiment in its application to the educational development of the boys and girls be it further

Resolved, That we commend the introduction of an annual field day meet.


