A GREAT BATTLE.

The battle of Liao Yang between the Japanese and Russians which raged for so many days, was one of the finest and most terrible struggles the world has ever witnessed.

But three times in the history of warfare have so many men been engaged, and never has a conflict been more desperately contested. There are more men in either army than the total engaged on both sides in any battle of the civil war.

The spectacle of half a million men murdering each other because of this game men call war is appalling to civilization.

It would seem that some nation should mediate and interfere. It is a safe assertion to say that had the Japanese been unsuccessful in the several battles of the war, the nations of earth would long since have insisted on a cessation of hostilities, but as long as Russia continues to get the worst of it and is likely to be driven out of Manchuria—a consumation devoutly hoped by America, England and Germany the war will pro-

ceed without molestation though its progress results in the loss of thousands of valuable lives and makes the prophecy of pruning hooks and plow shares as sounding brass and tinkling cymbals.

ROOSEVELTS ENEMIES.

Senator McClarren of Brooklyn was invited to take charge of Judge Parker's campaign in Brooklyn. The senator declined pleading that he could not afford it. Within a week he reconsidered and accepted the trust. Now comes Thomas Lawson the Boston multi-millionaire who is showing up the system by which the Standard oil people ruined thousands of men through the manipulation of the amalgamated copper deal, and offers to contribute one hundred thousand dollars to the democratic campaign fund if he cannot prove that the Standard oil company employed McClarren at a salary of \$20,000 a year to accept the position.

This is a condition that should appeal to every patriotic citizen.

If it be possible for these mighty corporations to humiliate and defeat a man because he chooses to be his own master and insists on obedience to law even on the part of those high in the social and commercial world, then this nation will cease to be of the people and for the people.

The election of Theodore Roosevelt to the presidency of the United States will be far more an American victory that it will be party victory and it will add another item to the great mass of historical events which tends to prove the ability of the people to govern themselves.

season and many other money making entertainments could be devised which should produce a thousand dollars for road development by the early spring. Let the Commercial club appoint a committee on entertainment to this end.


