Herne's "Shore Acres" is perhaps the best demonstration of this new shibboleth. The selected principle is in no wise curtailed or annulled by the adoption of "Art for Truth's Sake," as a guide in dramatic construction, but on the contrary becomes more necessary than ever "Shore Acres" is true from beginning to end, but it is truth artistically selected and welded into one harmonious whole. It is the highest and best expression of Mr. Herne's two-score years of experience on the stage, but, as he admitted, it was by a number of failures, which, though written on similar lines, were either too far in advance of public taste, or were, perhaps, faulty in dramatic construction. Mr. Herne's most successful plays have been "Shore Acres," "Hearts of Oak," and "Sag Harbor," and all three have won lavish praise from America's most discerning critics. A fine scenic production of "Shore Acres" will be given at the Gehling Theatre, Tuesday, Nov. 15.


