PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT.

The following proposed amendment to the constitution of the State of Nebraska, as hereinafter set forth in full, is submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska, to be voted upon at the general election to be held Tuesday, November 3rd, A. D. 1908.

A JOINT RESOLUTION to amend Sections two (2), four (4), five (5), six (6) and thirteen (13) of Article six (6) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska, relating to Judicial Powers.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEBRASKA:

Section 1. AMENDMENT PROPOSED. That Section two (2) of Article six (6) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska be amended to read as follows:
Section 2. (SUPREME COURT; JUDGES; JURISDICTION.) The Supreme Court shall consist of seven (7) judges; and a majority of all elected and qualified judges shall be necessary to constitute a quorum or pronounce a decision. The Supreme Court shall have jurisdiction in all cases relating to the revenue, civil cases in which the state is a party, mandamus, quo warranto, habeas corpus, and such appellate jurisdiction as may be provided by law.

Section 2. (AMENDMENT PROPOSED.) That Section four (4) of Article six (6) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska, be amended to read as follows:

Section 4. (SUPREME COURT; JUDGES; ELECTION; TERM; RESIDENCE.) The judges of the Supreme Court shall be elected by the electors of the state at large; and their term of office except as hereinafter provided shall be six years. And said Supreme Court judges shall during their term of office, reside at the place where the court is holden.

Section 3. (AMENDMENT PROPOSED.) That Section five (5) of Article six (6) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska be amended to read as follows:

Section 5. (SUPREME COURT; JUDGES; ELECTION; TERM; CHIEF JUSTICE.) That at the general election to be held in the state of Nebraska in the year 1909, and each six years thereafter, there shall be elected three (3) judges of the Supreme Court, who shall hold their office for the period of six years; that at the general election to be held in the state of Nebraska in the year 1911, and each six years thereafter, there shall be elected three (3) judges of the Supreme Court, who shall hold their office for the period of six years; and at the general election to be held in the state of Nebraska in the year 1913 and each six years thereafter, there shall be elected a Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, who shall hold his office for the period of six years. Provided that office expires in January 1914, shall be Chief Justice of the Supreme Court during that time until the expiration of his term of office. And provided further, that upon the adoption of these amendments by the electors of the State, the Governor shall, immediately upon issuing his proclamation declaring said amendments adopted, appoint four (4) judges of the Supreme Court, two (2) of whom shall be appointed to hold said office until their successors shall be elected at the general election in 1909, and have qualified; and the other two (2) shall hold their office until their successors shall be elected at the general election held in 1911, and have qualified.

Section 4. (AMENDMENT PROPOSED.) That Section six (6) of Article six (6) of the Constitution of the state of Nebraska, be amended to read as follows:

Section 6. (CHIEF JUSTICE.) The Chief Justice shall serve as such during all the term for which he was elected. He shall preside at all terms of the Supreme Court, and in his absence the judges present shall select one of their number to preside temporarily.

Section 5. (AMENDMENT PROPOSED.) That Section thirteen (13) of Article six (6) of the Constitution of Nebraska be amended to read as follows:

Section 13. (JUDGES; SALARIES.) That judges of the Supreme Court shall each receive a salary of \$1500, and the Judges of the District Court shall each receive a salary of \$800 per annum, payable quarterly.
Approved April 8, 1907.

Junkin, Secretary of State, of the State of Nebraska, do hereby certify that the foregoing proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of Nebraska is a true and correct copy of the original enrolled and engrossed bill, as passed by the Thirtieth session of the legislature of the State of Nebraska, as appears from said original bill on file in this office, and that said proposed amendment is submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Nebraska for their adoption or rejection at the general election to be held on Tuesday, the 3rd day of November, A. D. 1908.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and affixed the Great Seal of the State of Nebraska, Done at Lincoln, the 15th day of July, in the year of our Lord, One Thousand Nine Hundred and Eight, and of the Independence of the United States the One Hundred and Thirty-third, and of this State the Forty-second.

Kansas City Market Letter.

Kansas City Stock Yards.
July 20, 1908.
Although cattle receipts last week were moderate for the season, 45,000 head, the market softened all week and closing prices were 40 to 60 cents lower on steers and 25 cents lower on cows. Killers claim the hot weather has greatly reduced the demand, and used every effort to enforce the usual summer slump in prices. Fed cattle felt the loss fully as much as grassers, although they were scarce all week. The situation is different today, run here 14,000 head, and light supplies at all other points. Prices are 10 to 15 higher today, all kinds participating in the advance. At each decline this summer, receipts have dropped down sharply, bringing a recovery in prices which indicates either astute marketing, or an actual shortage in the total available cattle supply or possibly both. Top in the last week was \$7.35 and only a handful of cattle have exceeded \$7.00, account of extreme scarcity of prime grades. Bulk of the grazed westerns bring \$4.50 to \$5.75, grass cows at \$2.75 to \$3.75. A few tied cows bring up to \$4.50, and heifers as high as \$6.40, bulls \$2.40 to \$4.00. Veals are 50 to 75 cents higher than a week ago, at \$5.50 to \$6.00 for tops. Stockers and feeders closed last week about steady for the week, after selling stronger first of the week and are 10 to 25 higher today, stock steers \$3.00 to \$4.50, feeders \$4 to \$4.90. Illinois buyers took some fleshy feeders above \$5.00. The hog market made a net advance of 7 cents last week, although wide fluctuations were the rule from day to day. Packers contest every inch of the ground, and insist that present range is too high, but moderate receipts, 43,000 last week and 6000 today, give salesmen some advantage. The market is off 5 to 10 cents today, but closing prices are the best with top at \$6.60, bulk of sales \$6.40 to \$6.55. Heavy hogs still lead, account of scarcity, although shipping demand seldom calls for weights above 220 pounds. Pigs advanced 25 cents last week. Average weight of all the hogs is running under 200 pounds.

Mr. Grinstead was then appointed drainage commissioner, and will have actual charge of the construction of the ditch. Bids for the work are now being advertised for; such bids to be opened August 15. If no other serious thing happens dirt should be flying December first.—Salem Index.
