Flag Store Burned.

Nicolas Madrid suffered a severe loss Thursday night when his general merchandise store, on the south side of the plaza, burned to the ground.

The loss is between \$6,000 and \$7,000, with no insurance, his policy having lapsed some three months ago.

The fire started about 9:00 o'clock p. m. and burned till morning. Its origin is unknown. The great pile of inflammable material resisted every effort put forth by the people who turned out en masse to fight the flames. About \$500.00 in currency was also burned.

Fortunately the night was still, scarcely a breath of breeze blowing; and the flames and sparks carried the fire no further than its starting point. It was with difficulty, however, and only after strenuous effort, that Dr. W. R. Lovelace's residence, east of the burning building, was saved.

Mr. Madrid has not announced his plans for the immediate future, but it is possible, in view of his inherent energy and courage, he will take his loss with a smile and put up a better and bigger store.

\$10,000 School Building.

The Most Artistic and Modern In The Territory.

The Albuquerque Journal has the following on our new school house:

"Superintendent of Public Instruction J. E. Clark is preparing plans for a fine modern school building at Fort Sumner, Guadalupe county, to be built for the town by the Fort Sumner Land and Development company at a cost of \$10,000. The building will be in mission style, with placita and court with fountain and lawn, will have six rooms, all on one floor. Modern ventilating, heating, sanitary and lighting appliances will be features of what promises to be in some respects the most modern and most artistic school house in the territory."

This bit of information is the first publicity that has been given to a proposition that has been worked out between L. M. Disney of the Fort Sumner Land & Development company and the School Board.

The plan is for the company to erect a school building such as will properly serve the community. To do this the building will need to be one of the finest and best equipped in the Territory. Title will be held by the company until such time as a bond issue can be floated to transfer title to the people.

The nice appreciation of Fort Sumner's future shown by eastern capital is a constant source of encouragement to local people and should dispel every doubt entertained of our future.

Professor J. E. Clark is in town today attending the Guadalupe County Teacher's Convention and speaks enthusiastically of the plan. He says it has been worked out before in communities similarly situated and is not only feasible but very desirable.

Kansas City, Nov. 23.—Representative David A. De Armond, one of the best known members of the lower house of congress, and his young grandson were burned to death in the destruction of the De Armond home at Butler, Mo., early this morning.

Neither body has been recovered, and it is believed they were incinerated. Bones believed to be those of the congressman were found by the searchers this morning.

Other occupants of the house escaped. Mrs. De Armond, the wife of the congressman, fainted when she reached the ground and became hysterical and it was some time before she could tell what had happened.

The first she knew of the fire was when she heard her grandson call that the house was on fire. She barely had time to escape with her own life.

David De Armond was elected to congress in 1891 and has served since. He was born in March 1844, at Blair county, Pennsylvania.

Waddie De Armond, the dead boy, was a son of James A. De Armond, who lived across the street, and was visiting his grand parents. The boy was sleeping with his grandfather on the second floor of the house.
