YOKOHAMA, Japan, July 21.—Two American sailors named W. V. Dawson and E. Clifton have reached here after exciting experiences in the South Seas. Five Bears Killed With Bow and Arrow

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., July 21.—Slains of five arctic bears, killed by two San Francisco men, Dr. Jackson T. Page and Arthur H. Young, in Yellowstone park, are being stuffed and prepared for exhibition in the California Academy of Sciences museum here. Only five arctic bears were needed to kill the five, the hunters reported. Each animal was strangled by one shot, for a distance less than forty yards.

A fifth bear was killed, but not by an arrow. When the arrow failed to stop the animal, the men resorted to their guns. The bear was a female with cubs, and according to Young was the most ferocious found. Young is champion of the American bow and arrow championships. Dr. Page and Young hunted in the park under permit from the United States government.

Japan Completes Ten Steamships in Month

TOKYO, Japan, July 21.—Ten new steamships, each with a displacement exceeding 1000 tons, have been completed in various private Japanese shipyards during the last month. The combined tonnage of the vessels is 51,800.

Swapped Steel For Japanese Steamships

TOKYO, Japan, July 21.—The Eastern Standard, the last of the 23 steamships to be laid down for the United States shipping board, has been completed at the Uraga yards, according to a report issued by the shipping bureau of the department of communications. The aggregate tonnage of the 23 shipping board vessels built in Japanese yards is 273,500 tons. The steel used in the construction of the United States shipping board was partly supplied by Japan by the United States in exchange for the construction of the ships.

Forty Tons of Grenades Dumped Into the Sea

HONOLULU, T. H., July 19.—Forty tons of condemned hand grenades, primer caps and other defective ordnance material belonging to the Hawaiian department of the army were taken out to sea and dumped overboard recently. During the war regular practice in hand grenade throwing was held here, but since the armistice this class of instruction has fallen off. As the grenades will not keep indefinitely and are dangerous, they were dumped into the sea.
