The advance agent for Pool's Carnival arrived in Columbus last Friday night, and a hurry up call for business was made. The agent guaranteed a flat payment of \$500 and a liberal percentage on commissions, all of the money to go into the city treasury. **PLEADS GUILTY TO IMPERSONATING OFFICER.**
