Agricultural Success in New Mexico.

What can be done on New Mexico mountain tops is being shown by enterprising farmers in the Pecos and Sacramento ranges. One ranch on the Pecos Forest Reserve, at an elevation of 10,000 feet, produces the finest potatoes raised in the Southwest and vegetables in abundance. On the surrounding mesas, grass grows luxuriantly and some of the best milk cows in this section are to be found on this ranch, which sends its butter to the Albuquerque, Las Vegas and Santa Fe markets. In the Sacramento Mountains, at the same altitude, this year big crops of corn were raised. B. Weems, living at head of Bear Canon, did not plant his corn until July and yet he had a good crop. N. C. Lucas in James Canon raised 2,000 bushels of yellow corn and 4,000 bushels of beans. Wess Brackville, at Clonicroft, this past season, at an elevation of over 9,000 feet, raised an abundance of vegetables and roasting ears. All this goes to indicate that the mountains as well as the plains of New Mexico will be eventually the granary of the West. —Santa Fe New Mexico.

A special dispatch to one of the Denver papers from Prescott, A.T. reports great excitement in that district over the discovery of rich rock which the dispatch says, sampled \$5000 to the ton.

How would the Prescott people act if they lived in Silver City where nine miles away in the Central district a ton of ore was recently taken from the Lost mine which produce nearly \$4000 and where only one and one half miles distant from this city in Chloride Flat large hunks of virgin silver almost as big as a water-bucket are being taken out every day from the Grand Central mine. Surely it would throw them into a thousand fits a minute, and yet Silver City people are not unduly excited. It has become a common thing with them.

In fact so common that they do not display reasonable interest which two such strikes would arouse among the inhabitants of any other community.

It is safe to say that not twenty-five citizens of the town have displayed enough interest in the Chloride Flat strike to take a stroll over there some fine Sunday afternoon to see the rich ore in the sacks or on the dump and many of them seem to prefer to think that the pocket will soon play out. In this they will surely be greatly disappointed as each succeeding shot in the rich formation shows it to extend outward on all sides with increased depth and to give ample indications of developing into one of the richest silver strikes ever made in the southwest. —Silver City Enterprise.

gun was compelled to open the vault in the institution. J. M. Greenlee and an unknown woman entered the bank while the robbery was in progress, and they also were forced to elevate their hands. The woman fainted from fright. After the money from the vault had been hastily swept into a satchel the two men jumped through a back window of the building, and, climbing into a light buggy, dashed off to at least temporary safety. It is the belief that the bold robbers are still within the city limits. —Rocky Mountain News.

Sheriff Garcia had been allowing the prisoners in the run-around during the day time and as usual went about six o'clock to lock them in their cells. Godines had been accustomed to retiring early, and this time arranged the bedding so as to make it appear that he was there, but instead supposed to have secreted himself, on top of the cells and that night dug out through the walls making his escape. HAGERMAN APPOINTED GOVERNOR.

Ed Foss, has just received a message from Washington stating that Herbert J. Hagerman, has been appointed governor of New Mexico.

Perfecto Uribe, who was working on the Granville section on the C. & S. came to Clayton Thursday for the purpose of getting his trunk. While attempting to alight from a moving freight train here, his coat caught on a nail and caused him to land under the wheels. His right arm was severed from his body between the elbow and shoulder, the right side of his head and face struck the railing which caused very ugly wounds. Dr. Aekley was quickly summoned who dressed his wounds and administered medical attention until he was carried to Trinidad hospital this morning.

FOUR STORES BURGLARIZED IN CLAYTON LAST NIGHT.

Last night while Constable R. T. Mansker was at supper his market was broken into and what cash the drawer contained was taken. Mr. Mansker which is his regular custom, returned to his shop after supper, to take up the cash, finding he was relieved of that burden, went to the back door and window and nothing unusual seemed to have occurred there, so he supposed George Tinsley, his clerk taken out the cash, on account of a large crowd being in town.

About two hours later while on

his way home John Evelyn saw a man smashing in a window at the depot he ran back to McQueen's drug store and gave the alarm. Mr. McQueen and O. J. Schneider hurried over to the scene of action and captured the burglar, a man going by the name of George Edwards.

It was soon learned that Schneider's saddle and harness store had been entered several pair of gloves were taken. A further search by R. T. Mansker and J. C. Hill developed that Fawcett & Dean's store had been entered and six suits of clothes taken, which were found in a coal car. A side window in Bob Isaacs' hardware store was smashed in so that the latch could be reached from the outside. Bob says, so far as he knows, a lot of unpaid statements and three games of pitch that cost him a couple of dollars, was all he lost that night. The goods taken from Schneider were found at the depot. Mr. Mansker, after seeing his clerk this morning and learning that he had left the money in the drawer, went back to the window and found that it had been opened. He then went up to the jail and searched Edwards' clothes, finding money exactly corresponded with the money that Tinsley said was left in the drawer. Edwards shoes fitted the tracks made at Mansker's window.

So far as known all goods taken were found and returned. Edwards came to Clayton about two weeks ago and has been working at the shoemaker's trade. Thos. Guggerty, a night operator on the C. & S., was arrested on suspicion, Guggerty has been a close companion of Edwards since his arrival to Clayton. The officers believe that Fawcett & Dean's store was burglarized after Edwards landed in jail.
