## FESTIVAL DAYS TO BE BEST EVER HELD

Next Friday and Saturday Will See Carrizozo in the Biggest Field Day Celebration Town Ever Had

## CELEBRATED EL PASO CORNET BAND TO FURNISH MUSIC

Every day brings additional proof that next Friday and Saturday will see Carrizozo in what is by far the biggest field day celebration she has ever had. There will be more features and bigger features than at any previous time, and money has not been spared in getting together a show which will afford every one a grand time. People are talking about it the county over, and they will be here early the first day to join with the citizens of Carrizozo in this big and brisk season of fun.

Every plan mentioned in these columns, since we began to talk about the prospects, has been made an assured event of the two days of sport. In no degree have the business men of this enterprising and justly prosperous town craved anything in the way of adding to the success of the celebration. Every individual has his share of the load and results have naturally followed. Only co-operation of the real kind could ever have brought the program up to what it is this year and the entire county—yes, the world itself—is urged to share the results of this incomparable enterprise.

The big sixteen piece band from El Paso will be here with bells, and everything else which makes for good, snappy music. Realizing the size of this celebration, basket ball teams from other counties are anxious to compete in the big series here. No one has been turned down, a series of ten games is programmed and will be carried out on schedule time. Carrizozo is practicing with all its might trying to get in condition to contribute its part to the quality of the show. That other teams are also on the job is not an unreasonable supposition. We predict that this feature will be a winner and every team will star in the playing of a fast, clean game, the spectators delight.

The songs and musical selections of all kinds for the big free concert at the Methodist church Friday evening are of the kind to suit the taste of everybody. No junk of the ordinary run will be given, but the very best of the better class. A delightful Japanese song is being worked up by a big chorus, and the school selections will all be the kind that people like. A male quartette will appear with some excellent numbers, and the entire program bespeaks careful selection

and rendition of every item.

Each night there will be a big dance at Real's Hall. The floor is being replaced, the band will be on the job, and there will be a big time for all who are adapted and addicted to the terpsichorean art. The only question will be room enough to navigate around the floor for they will all be there—all who are not somewhere else celebrating in some other fashion.

## STATE FAIR COMMISSION STILL ACTIVE

Excursion Rates on all Railroads and it is Believed Hundreds will Attend From Each County

## A BIG INDIAN EXHIBIT IS BEING ARRANGED FOR

Albuquerque, New Mex. Sept. 23. "They thought I was crazy", declared Secretary R. W. Wiley, of the state fair commission, upon his return from a recent trip to Denver to secure tents for the fair. "They couldn't understand how any sane man would want to spend that amount of money for the rent of tents for one week's time."

Mr. Wiley's trip was made for the purpose of securing the canvas to cover the exhibits that are to be shown at Albuquerque from October 11 to October 16 next, this expedient having been made necessary by reason of the destruction of the fair buildings by fire several weeks ago. The rental of these tents will come to the tidy sum of \$1,200 for the week, and the spread of canvas will be one of the greatest ever seen in the United States. It is no wonder that the Denver tent manufacturers were told the size of Mr. Wiley's order, which was the biggest: that they had ever received.

That not only the governor, the two United States senators, the congressmen from New Mexico and all state officials, but the judge and district attorney of every district in the state will be invited to take part in the opening day ceremonies was the announcement recently made from State headquarters. "If this is to be the sort of state fair that we have set out to make it" declared President Putney, "there should be a full attendance of the representatives of the people of every part of New Mexico. I want this opening day to mark a new era in the progress of the New Mexico fair, and I am appealing to all public officials to help me make it so."

How public spirited the people of New Mexico are, was shown recently in the sale of the boxes for the fair. A stiff price was put on these boxes, not because they were worth it, for they were not, but as an appeal to the loyalty and enthusiasm of the people in support of the fair. Fifty dollars was the sum asked for each box, and in an astonishingly short time, nineteen checks for fifty dollars each had been received at fair headquarters, with the returns from several more to be heard from.

An official of the Denver and Rio Grande railroad has been sent into San Juan county to arrange for an excursion from that county to the fair, and one from the Colorado Southern has gone into Union county for the same purpose. It is believed that these excursions will bring at least a hundred visitors to the fair from each of the counties named.

President Putney, accompanied by Governor McDonald, attended the Farmington fair last week and returned to Albuquerque by way of Shiprock, where they stopped to arrange for bringing to the state fair the biggest Indian exhibit ever shown anywhere in this country.

## "SPEED KING" NOT GUILTY

Allen Johnson, of Johnson Brothers Garage, was arrested by Deputy John Baird and tried yesterday afternoon upon complaint made by the officer making the arrest. It was alleged by Baird and others that the racer which Johnson was driving was exceeding the speed limit of fifteen miles per hour at street or highway intersections as alleged offense was committed at the intersection of El Paso avenue and Fourth Street. A trial by jury was demanded by defendant and W. W. Standtman, J. F. Morse, Brent Paden, Julian Taylor, H. B. Dawson and S. G. Anderson acted in this capacity. Various estimates were made by witnesses concerning the speed which the car was making, ranging from twenty-five to thirty-five miles per hour, but the driver and Geo. J. Dingwall, who was also in the racer, both asserted that they could not possibly have been making more than fifteen miles per hour, since car was started from a stand still at the Watson Ford Salesrooms. Nothing conclusive could be determined and the jury dismissed the case as a result. We trust that the moral effect of this trial will not be entirely lost, for the law is wisely enacted and makes for the general good. Enough accidents of the unavoidable class happen to make it inexcusable to use the streets of town as a speedway for a rattling run.
