

# CARRIZOZO OUTLOOK

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## BASKET BALL TEAMS ARE STILL ACTIVE

Local Basket Ball Teams Went to Capitan Saturday Where They Contested for the Honors of the County

### CAPITAN PEOPLE PROVED TO BE GENEROUS HOSTS

The Carrizozo High School basket ball teams, both girls and boys, together with practically every second team player, made an excursion to Capitan Saturday to contest for honors against the two teams representing the county high school. The Carrizozo delegation made the trip in five automobiles, the first installment reached Capitan at ten-thirty and the others in rapid succession. The visitors were received at the school building by the school faculty and members of the teams.

An extra feature of the day was the tennis games between Belknap and Smith of Capitan and Franklin and McCurdy of Carrizozo. Capitan won the first two sets; the first by the score of 6 to 3 and the second set was concluded 7 to 5, Capitan showing rare ability to pull out of the hole after the score was 5 to 1 in favor of the visitors.

This event was followed by the serving of a dainty two course luncheon by the girls of the domestic science department. The menu consisted of assorted sandwiches, lettuce and banana salad, pickles and olives, and fried chicken, for the first course and hot chocolate and assorted cake for the second course. Some of the Carrizozo ball novitiates, being unused to the distressing necessity of curbing their appetites, felt the effect of this generous repast in the early afternoon exertion, but much credit was due the girls for the excellent quality of the eatables.

The girls' basket ball game was begun as soon after lunch as practicable, and after struggling with a greatly improved team, Carrizozo won by the unusually low margin of 14 to 9. This does not mean that Carrizozo was not on the job all the time, but that Capitan had seen some places which a shift would reinforce, and the score shows as such.

The boys' game was begun shortly after both halves of the girls' contest had been played, and, although Capitan had the score well on their side of the page all the way through, it was seen from the outset of the game that the boys from Carrizozo were going to give a better account of themselves than they had previously done. More team work was evident, and, during the second half the ball was decidedly partial to Carrizozo's end of the field, Capitan's veteran guards being unable to prevent 9 scores by the Carrizozo forwards and center. Capitan's score was 38 points, but Coach Franklin is greatly encouraged by the stubborn resistance which his team showed against the overwhelming odds which they were facing throughout the progress of the

game. For this game the players were able to secure the services of Mr. Paulson, employee of the Fisher Lumber Co as a referee and the able manner in which he handled the game insures him a welcome to Carrizozo when a return game shall be played.

The Capitan people have shown themselves to be generous hosts and the spirit of good fellowship which prevailed throughout the day means much toward the building up of a proper spirit between the two leading educational institutions of Lincoln County.

### EDUCATIONAL MEET

The State Department of Education wishes to attract the attention of the general public to the New Mexico Educational Association which will hold its annual meeting at Albuquerque Thanks giving week. State Superintendent White hopes to be able to secure from the railroads the rate of one fare for the round trip, instead of a fare and a third as on previous occasions. The Carrizozo teachers expect to attend this big educational meet without a single exception, and the central thought and controlling idea of the coming association will be the elimination of illiteracy in the State of New Mexico.
