Todos duenos de propiedad que falten de hacer sus cedulas entre el primer dia de Marzo y el primer dia de Mayo de cada ano, no seran concedidos la exencion de \$200.00 proveida por ley."

El retorno personalmente de su propiedad con el asesor cuando este en su precinto se hallara mas ganancioso a Vd. y al asesor y ayudara el asesor en la traba jo de su oficina.
