

A NEW COUNTY SALARIES BILL

Santa Fe, N. M., May 15.—The county salary bill which has been prepared by the finance committee of the senate, was introduced in that body today in the form of senate substitute for Senate Bill No. 106. This bill was the Hinkle bill. The new measure was prepared by the committee after consultation with various county officials and after several public hearings. It has the endorsement of all members of the committee and an effort will be made to pass it. In counties of the first class, county commissioners get \$800 and treasurer and assessor \$4,000 each; the sheriff, \$3,500; deputy sheriffs, not to exceed \$1,500; county clerk, \$4,000; probate judge, \$600; superintendent of schools, \$1,500, and the county surveyor, \$10 a day in all class counties when actually employed.

In second class counties county commissioners, \$600; treasurer and assessor, \$3,250; sheriff, \$3,000; deputy sheriff not to exceed \$1,500; county clerk, \$3,250; probate judge, \$500; superintendent of schools, \$1,500.

Counties of the third class: county commissioners, \$400; treasurer and assessor, \$2,500; sheriff, \$2,000; deputies not to exceed \$1,000; county clerk, \$2,500; probate judge, \$400; superintendent of schools, \$1,250.

In counties of the fourth class: county commissioners, \$300 each; treasurer and assessor, \$1,750; sheriff, \$1,750; deputy sheriffs not to exceed, \$700; county clerk, \$1,750; probate judge, \$300; superintendent of schools \$100.

The bill provides that until relieved by law from the performance of the duties of clerk of district courts the county clerks of the several counties will receive additional pay as follows: First class, \$1,000; second class, \$750; third class, \$500; fourth class, \$250. The compensation of county jailers: first class, \$600; second class, \$480; third class, \$400; fourth class, \$300 per annum. Jail guards, \$1.50 per day. The cost of feeding prisoners shall not exceed forty cents a day for each prisoner.

District attorneys: Districts of the first class \$3,500; assistants, \$1,000; districts of the second class, \$3,000; assistants, \$500. Districts of the third class, \$2,500, no assistants provided for.

Under this bill Torrance will be a fourth class county.

A GOOD BILL

Following is the text of a bill introduced in the house by Mr. Hilton. It's short as it is good, and should take but a few minutes time of the legislature to make it into a law.

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person in the State of New Mexico to exhibit any moving picture or slot machine, depicting the enactment of any crime, or the immorality or infidelity of any woman. Any person violating the provisions of this Act shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$100.00, to which may be added imprisonment in the county jail not exceeding three months.
