The alfalfa patch north of the
Holloway store was cut this week
and made a heavy yield. It had
made a fine growth, and has
completely demonstrated that
with a reasonable amount of
water alfalfa will flourish mightily
in the Estancia valley. It's
simply a question of getting it
started and thereafter giving it
water occasionally. The railroad
company furnished the water to
irrigate this patch.

Estancia is to be the official
supply station between Amarillo,
Texas, and Albuquerque, New
Mexico, for the thousands of automobiles
which will pass through
here next year on their way to
the San Francisco and San Diego
fairs. Arrangements are on foot
towards erecting a large supply
house at this point which will be
able to furnish from a pint to a
carload of gasoline and oil on a
moment's notice.

A state Democratic convention
has been called to meet in Albuquerque
August 17th. This convention
will nominate a candidate for
congress, and a candidate for
member of the State Corporation
Commission. The representation
is based on the vote for Ferguson
in 1912, one delegate for each 100
votes or major portion. This apportionment
gives Torrance county 5
delegates. There will be 217
votes in the convention.

few hours, having had no water
meanwhile. In this connection,
we have heard that alfalfa bloat
can be surely prevented by putting
lime in the water which animals
drink. Why shouldn't the same
thing prevent bloat from thistles?

RAILROAD TALK

That the interests represented
by him probably would arrange
with bondholders to buy the New
Mexico Central railroad when it
is sold July 1 to satisfy the Independent
Steel and wire Co.'s the
Pittsburgh Trust company's and
other claims, was stated by Col.
W. S. Hopewell yesterday.

Judge Loren C. Collins, special
master, will begin today the advertisement
of the sale of the road at public
auction on July 1, in accordance
with the decree granted May 6, in
the district court at Santa Fe. No
bid for less than \$150,000 will be
considered.

Mr. Hopewell when first asked
what his associates' plans were,
said they were questionable. The
sale, however, he asserted, was
part of the plans to disentangle
the road from legal meshes.

Later Mr. Hopewell said they
probably would arrange with the
bondholders to bid in the property.
He would not admit that this
arrangement was more than likely.
He thought perhaps that there
would be other bidders, although
he was not sure, and if their offer
was high enough, the bondholders
probably would not acquiesce to
this plan.

Judge E. A. Mann said he
knew nothing of any plans on the
part of anyone to purchase the
company.—Albuquerque Journal.
