Apolonio Gonzales, who was shot about two weeks ago in a difficulty over sheep grazing, is reported getting along all right. He received a charge of shot in the leg below the knee. He was herding sheep for Francisco Sanchez eight or nine miles southwest of town, where the shooting occurred.

Receiver Ely of the N. M. C., with a party of magnates, is to be here Friday in a special train. They will take an automobile trip in the country from here, and then go on to Torrance. The precise object of the trip is not known, but presumably it is for the purpose of interesting outside parties in the road or country, or both.

News was received here last Saturday of the death of Judge Mann, which occurred in an automobile accident near Gallup on Friday evening. He was returning from the Gibson mine in company with four other men in a heavy touring car driven by a citizen of Gallup. The car turned over in rounding a corner where there was considerable sand. Judge Mann was caught under the car and his neck was broken. Two others of the party were so badly injured as to remain unconscious or delirious for some time, and the other two were painfully bruised. Judge Mann was to have been here this week to attend court. He was well known by the older residents, having been judge of this district. Of recent years when in Estancia he frequently recalled incidents of early days here when there was no court house and court was held in rude shacks, and occasionally adjourned from one to another. His sudden death was a great shock to his friends here.

## COUNTY ROAD REPORT

Following is a report to the State Highway Commission on road work in this county:

Mountainair, N. M., November 19, 1915.

State Highway Commission, Santa Fe, N. M.

Gentlemen:

I have just secured the data necessary for our annual report of work done for the year ending October 31st, and the following summary is submitted for your consideration:

We graded 30 1/2 miles of new road, and regraded 14 miles. We made a new road, with what we call the Dillon Drag, in various parts of the county aggregating 172 miles; and we put cinders on part of the road between Encino and Duran.

We put in about 25 culverts and small bridges, most of these being along the foothills of the Manzano mountains.

We also built the approaches to the viaduct across the A. T. & S. F. Ry. at Mountainair, at a cost of \$197.00.

We collected but very little cash, and what we have done has been largely done with the per capita road tax alone. We have issued 1129 receipts for labor. Very little cash was collected, as nearly everyone who did not work, paid for teams on the grader, and took a receipt for labor.

The distribution of work is as follows:

Manzano-Torreon, 109 receipts;

At various places along the foothills, 21 receipts;

Tajique-Chillili, 28 receipts, and 47 days' work donated;

In the town of Estancia, which is incorporated, 72 receipts, and \$238.50 cash donated and expended on the streets by us;

Manzano - Punta - Mountainair Road, 246 receipts;

In and near town of Tajique, 79 receipts;

In and near the town of Torreon, 97 receipts;

21 receipts from Estancia, West, North and East.

We graded most of the road from Tajique to the county line toward Chillili, the citizens helping us materially with donated labor.

We built three bridges in the vicinity of Tajique, we furnishing the material and the citizens doing the work gratis.

We graded 3 1/2 miles of the road from Encino to Duran, and dragged two miles with the Dillon Drag.

We dragged seven miles of the road from Duran to Pinos Wells, and 35 miles from Duran toward Roswell.

We dragged four miles of the road from Encino to Pinos Wells, and 35 miles from Encino toward Las Vegas.

We dragged 10 miles of the road from Palma to Moriarty; 25 miles of road from Encino to Estancia; and 24 miles of the road Encino to Lucy.

We regraded about a mile at Mountainair; and worked the hill coming out of Abo Canyon; and have about half the tax labor in Mountainair and Abo precincts to collect and work.

We are pretty well collected, in except about three or four precincts over in the southeast part of the county, which we are now working as fast as we can.

All the inter-county roads are in very good shape, except that through Abo Pass, and the connection between Willard and Lucy. The Torrance county part of the road from Estancia by way of Moriarty and Tijeras Canyon is all prairie, and is in very good shape for an ungraded road. Very little work will be required in Torrance county on the road from Estancia by way of McIntosh and Chillili through Cedar Canyon and Tijeras.

Excessive floods along the mountains in the summer played

havoc with many of our bridges and culverts, and parts of our graded road, but these have been repaired temporarily, and the road is now in very good condition.

The citizens of Mountainair dragged the road from Mountainair to La Gran Quivira to connect with the Carrizozo road at that place, and this road is now in good condition clear through.
