Hon. John Goode, president of the Virginia Constitutional Convention, in a recent address to his constituents, gives a summary of the work done by the Convention as follows:

It has accomplished the paramount object for which the convention was called, by eliminating illiterate negro suffrage and at the same time preserving the right to the white man as far as it could possibly be done without violating the Fifteenth Amendment of the Federal Constitution.

It has reduced the expenses of the State government without impairing its honest and efficient administration. According to a carefully prepared statement made by a prominent member of the convention, it has saved to the tax-payers of the State \$355,000.15 per annum, and has gained in revenue by adding to the taxable values the handsome sum of \$275,000 per annum.

It has provided a new jury system which will not only greatly facilitate the trial of cases, but save considerable expense to the State, and also to the counties, cities and towns.

It has introduced salutary reforms into the Executive, Legislative and Judiciary Departments.

It has greatly improved the system of common free school education.

It has made valuable changes in the organization of counties and in the government of cities and towns.

It has devised an entirely fair and equitable system of taxation, and has reduced the rate of taxation 10 cents in the \$100 worth of property, upon the theory that no more money should be taken from the pockets of the people than is absolutely necessary to defray the expenses of government economically administered.

By changing the system of exemptions from taxation from taxes, which has heretofore obtained, it has added at least \$5,000,000 to the taxable values of the State.

It has adopted a plan for the government of public institutions and prisons which will not only greatly improve their efficiency, but remove them entirely from the domain of party politics.

It has made it mandatory upon the General Assembly to enact laws preventing all trusts, combinations and monopolies inimical to the public welfare.

It has established a Corporation Commission with the power of supervising, regulating and controlling all transportation and transmission companies in all matters relating to their public duties and their charges for the same. This has been done with no purpose to cripple or embarrass these valuable public utilities, but to protect the people from unreasonable and unjust exactions.

Taking it altogether, my opinion is that the people of Virginia have never had a better Constitution, and I think that the judgment of posterity will be that the members of the convention have built better than they knew.

He not only denies that any pledge was given by the Norfolk Convention, but says that "the convention had no power to bind the judgment and conscience of a Constitutional Convention called into existence by the fiat of the sovereign people."

The President of France, in a spirit of friendship for the American people, recently signified his intention to confer the cross of the Legion of Honor upon two officers of exalted rank in the American Army and Navy, and naturally concluded that General Miles and Admiral Dewey were worthy of that distinguished honor. Teddy to whom the matter was referred asked for a few days to consider the request and has since reached the conclusion that neither of them were worthy to receive such a badge of distinction at the hands of the French people. The fact, that the question was one which he had no right to consider, much less to pass upon, seems to have counted for nothing with him, and with the knowledge which the people of the country have of Teddy's disregard for the proprieties and contempt for the laws of the land no one, of course, is surprised that he could not resist the temptation presented to him to gratify his personal spite against Miles and Dewey. Our sister republic will not be offended though, at the manner in which its offer of the cross of the Legion of Honor to them has been received, if its people are properly advised as to the littleness of the man, and as to the very small measure in which he is a representative of the sentiments of the American people.

Admiral William T. Sampson died in Washington Tuesday, and it is believed, that his death was hastened by events following the war with Spain. No one is to be blamed, however, if this be true but himself. The people of the country did not believe at the time of the battle of Santiago that he was the victor in an engagement in which he had not participated and would have justified themselves if they had been willing to accord to him honor which he did not deserve. That he was an officer of great merit, though, is not questioned, and it is to be regretted, that, instead of making an effort to besmear the reputation of Admiral Schley, he was not possessed of those personal qualities which would have enabled him to see in the victory of Santiago, "glory enough for all."

The anniversary of Gen. "Stonewall" Jackson's birthday, May 10th, will be celebrated at Woodstock by appropriate services, under the management of the Daughters of the Confederacy.

Virginia News.

The Norfolk Outdoors have headed war on the best trout, and one firm announced a cut of one-third in trust prices.

Rev. Dr. Joseph Parkard, dean of the faculty of the Theological Seminary of Virginia, died Saturday, aged nearly 90 years.

The soft crab has begun to make its appearance, and a good number of shipments were made from the Rappahannock last week.

The testing the constitutionality of the Governor's veto of the Congressional reapportionment bill has, it is believed, been practically abandoned.

Gov. Montague, of Virginia, was the orator at the commencement of the University of Maryland School of Medicine in the Academy of Music Baltimore Monday.

Many farmers of Rockbridge have plowed up their fields of wheat and planted them in corn, so short and damaged was the wheat. Their time, seed and fertilizers are a dead loss.

The Democrats of a half dozen counties on Monday voted in favor of proclaiming the new Constitution. So far only one county has voted for submitting the Constitution to the voters of the State.

The annual commencement exercises of the Episcopal Theological Seminary of Virginia, near Alexandria, will begin Wednesday evening, June 12th, and close with ordination services Friday the 20th instant.

W. O. Harding and Alvah Harding, both of Lancaster county, were fined last week for violating the local option law. The former being fined \$300 and the latter \$150. Both were also put under bond for \$500.

The Democrats of Prince William at a meeting at Masses instructed Hon. J. B. T. Thornton to vote for proclaiming the constitution. One of the districts of the county had previously passed resolutions instructing for submission.

Andrew C. Griffith, the oldest Mason in Winchester died last week aged eighty years. He was the oldest Knight Templar in Virginia and one of five persons now living who initiated the President McKinley into Masonry during the civil war.

The proposed unveiling of a monument on the Battle of Bull Run, near Spotsylvania Courthouse, by the Forty-ninth New York Regiment, which was set for May 12, has been postponed until October, when an elaborate program of ceremonies will be carried out.

Dr. W. F. Dunaway, addressed the voters of Richmond county at Warsaw Monday on the new constitution. A resolution endorsing the services of Dr. Dunaway and approving the constitution as a whole was adopted. Dr. Dunaway asserted that he was in favor of proclaiming.

The Anti-Saloon League of Virginia is engaged in compiling a "Book of Remembrance," in which will be entered the record of every public man in the State. The league has no idea of putting up any temperance candidates, but they will keep tabs on the nominees and support those whose records are clear.

Work has begun on the new building for the E. Mumford Bank at Warsaw, Richmond county. Lancaster boasts of having two magnificent banks—one national and one State—Northumberland one, and now Richmond is to have one. Twenty-eight months ago a bank in the Northern Neck had not been seriously thought of even.

A mass meeting of Democrats held at Gloucester C. B. Monday, with County-Chairman J. N. Tabb presiding. Hon. J. N. Stubbbs offered resolutions in favor of submitting the Constitution to the electorate. Mr. Tabb vacated the chair and offered a resolution favoring proclamation which was adopted by a vote of 48 to 8.

The penitentiary commission, of which Dr. LeCato is chairman, met in Richmond Wednesday and selected a site for the new building, which is to be fireproof, is to be constructed after the most approved plans. The commission determined to locate the building on the Spring street side of the penitentiary lot, which is to be begun as soon as the architect prepares the plans.

Congressman Peter J. Otey, of the Sixth district, died in his home in Lynchburg, Sunday afternoon. For two years he had suffered with a severe heart trouble, but on his arrival home from Washington his condition did not seem to be worse, his relatives were not anxious about him. Friday night of last week, there was a sudden change and from that hour it was feared that the end was approaching. He is survived by a widow and three children.
