Virginia News

Richmond negroes have formed a Roosevelt and Fairbanks Club. The members, were addressed by Col. Lester Crum, of the Port of Charleston, S. C., who eulogized the President.

Col. Thomas Marshall Smith died at his home in Orange, June 29th, aged 79 years. He was born in Fauquier county and was one of a number of brothers, all of whom distinguished themselves in the professions or in business.

On the ground that the State School Board failed to select the new public-school books as required by the constitution, a mandamus will probably be prayed to keep them from being used in the school till the Supreme Court has rendered a decision.

Gov. Montague has received from Mrs. Leola Tyler Temple, of Washington, daughter of President John Tyler, a handsome painting of the Natural Bridge, by Matteo of Genoa, Italy, painted in 1852 and presented to Mrs. Temple. Mrs. Temple has donated the painting to the State.

In the Circuit Court of Page county, at Luray, John J. Skelton, a former school teacher, was fined \$50 and ordered to jail for six months for the illicit sale of whisky. Maggie Sites, an operator of a liquor "speakeasy," was fined \$80 and costs and ordered to jail for eight months. S. D. and Ernest Celler, grocers, were fined \$150 for the same offense.

The State board of education in session in Richmond, suspended Superintendent of Schools John S. Riley, of Bedford county, pending his trial in the county of Bedford. Mr. Riley was recently indicted by the grand jury. He is charged with inducing his wife to place a value of \$500 on a piano destroyed by fire which cost but \$85. The board adopted a resolution under which no member of the State, city, or county committee, or who engaged continuously in partisan politics, shall hold any position in connection with the public school system.

Thomas Potts, a veteran of the Civil War, who died last week, claimed it was he who killed General "Stonewall" Jackson at the battle of Chancellorsville. He was a private in a Maine regiment and was on picket duty the night General Jackson was shot. For many years he did not pretend to have killed the general, but when it became known some harm might come to him, recently Mr. Potts said: "I know that history says General Jackson was shot by one of his own men, but that is not so. It was a shot from my gun that killed him at Chancellorsville, which Jackson was near our pickets looking for some of his men."

Tuberculous consumption will be fought systematically in Richmond and Virginia very soon. The Associated Charities are perfecting plans for checking its progress and reducing it, as a scourge, to the plane of the once dreaded smallpox and the plague. The Charities' nurses following the lines successfully operated in the North, of having a highland farm near the city and caring for the worst cases there, milder forms of the disease being treated at the home of the patient by prescribed diet and sanitation. In this way from 60 to 75 per cent. of early cases are curable and many lives are saved in the advanced stages of the disease.
