#### Destructive Hail Storm.

A violent and destructive hail storm passed over the upper part of the county last Sunday afternoon, causing damage to crops, killing poultry, and breaking glass in dwellings and potato beds at a loss to the sufferers of many thousands of dollars. The storm was so violent in some sections, it is reported, that no one could be exposed to it without danger of losing his life. Two gentlemen in Cattail Neck caught out in it were compelled to seek shelter, with eyes blacked and faces scarred by the hailstones in the few seconds it took them to get under cover. The storm lasted about 20 minutes and passed over a breadth of from a half to one mile, from Cattail Neck via Hallwood to Assawoman.

Among the sufferers reported to us were Messrs Parker S. Kelley, Geo. W. Coloma, W. S. Byrd, Henry P. Byrd, Thorogood Kilmon, W. W. Trader, Sewell Grotton and Capt. Henry T. Davis—and their losses are estimated at from \$50 to \$250. In addition to them scores of others suffered almost as much loss and it is impossible to estimate the damage that was done by the storm. While it was raging the dwelling of Mr. Sewell Grotton, occupied by Mr. James Nock, was struck by lightning and damaged \$200 or more. The crops of everyone in the storm belt were injured and of others were almost entirely destroyed.
