The tenth annual meeting of the Accomac Educational Association to be held on Chincoteague, April 16th and 17th, promises to be full of interest and instruction to all in attendance.

Prominent Virginia Republicans are authority for the statement that C. Bascomb Slemm, the Virginia Congressman from the Ninth district, has been offered a position in the Cabinet of William H. Taft, of Ohio, in the event that he is elected to the Presidency.

The House by a close vote killed the oyster bill, which, to some extent, provided for the breaking of the Baylor survey. It had passed the Senate, but in the lower branch encountered strong opposition.

The Legislature of Virginia adjourned on Thursday. The only matter acted upon on that day was concurrence in the House joint resolution providing for the formulation of the procedure in the Blackstone case when the Legislature convenes on the 25th.

The First District Democratic Committee met Thursday and decided to hold a primary election for the nomination to Congress Saturday, June 13.
