ACCOMAC COURT HOUSE, VA.

Saturday, March 28, 1908.

Hon. Wm. Jennings Bryan delivered a speech of two hours and thirty minutes in the city auditorium of Richmond on Wednesday evening and was accorded an ovation rarely given to the most popular citizens even of our own State.

The people of Accomac, with a proper regard for the enforcement of the laws of the State and who are willing to accord to a faithful public servant the praise that is due to him, will unite with the writer of an article in this issue of the paper in commendation of Mr. S. James Turlington, our efficient Commonwealth's Attorney, for the faithful service rendered by him in the Norfolk city court in the prosecution of the "Onancock Riot cases."

The Legislature, of Virginia, after a recess of two weeks, was reconvened on Wednesday for the purpose of acting finally upon charges heretofore formulated against Judge Blackstone, received an answer from him as the charges and referred the entire subject to the Committee for Courts of Justice of the two houses with instructions to report back at once.

A House bill increasing the pay of persons engaged in the Life Saving service of Virginia has been passed by the United States Senate. The salaries of superintendents are increased from \$2,000 to \$2,200 and of keepers from \$900 to \$1,000.

The State Democratic committee, Tuesday night, selected Roanoke, June 11, for the State convention to send delegates to Denver. The representation will be a delegate for every 100 votes or fraction over 50 cast in the last Presidential election.

Governor Swanson has appointed Dr. Edwin A. Alderman, president University of Virginia; Hon. Rosewell Page of Hanover and James B. Russell, of Winchester, delegates to Conference on National Resources at the White House, Washington, May 18.

A. P. Rowe, of Fredericksburg has been elected a member of the committee from the First district, to succeed H. H. Wallace, and R. H. Henderson, of Danville, a member of the committee from the Fifth district to succeed R. F. Tompkins.
