Fruitful in Romances.

The English baronetage is fairly fruitful in romances. A cabman baronet who resides at Burton-on-Trent, Sir Walter Tyrrell, can trace his descent from the Sir Walter Tyrrell whose armorial shield William Rufus in the New Forest so many centuries ago. The ancient borough of Tamworth boasts a tobaccoist baronet, Sir Harry Goring, who serves workingmen customers with ounces of thick twist, his family estate having long ago vanished into the ewigkiet. Three to One For Rain.

People have learned by experience to make allowance for error in the predictions of the weather bureau, but Professor Schuster thinks that the allowances should be officially stated. Astronomers, it appears, are in the habit of giving the value of the "probable error" when publishing their observations. But, although meteorology lends itself more readily than any other science to the evolution of deviations from the mean result, the weather forecasters have not adopted the custom of stating the probable error. Professor Schuster looks forward to the time when weather forecasts will be accompanied by a statement of the odds that the prediction will be fulfilled. Then perhaps we shall read in the weather column not simply "rain tomorrow," but "three to one" or "nine to one for rain tomorrow."—Exchange.

The Lesson of the Morgue.

M. Gaud, for thirty years the superintendent of the Paris morgue, said farewell to the greswome place with tears in his eyes and words of regret on his lips. Newspaper men asked him for "experiences" and "impressions," and when he had given them he received from those who heard him the title "philosopher of the morgue." To a representative of the Matin he said that he had been very happy at the morgue and had learned there the lesson of life. "When one sees before him continually," he said, "what it is for which we work and slave and commit all sorts of folly, our fears and our worries vanish. Of course it took quite a while before I realized that a dead man is no longer a man before I learned to look upon those who are brought here from the physical point only. Until that was accomplished I could not eat except with aversion. Two weeks cured me."

London and Paris.

There is evidence to show that London was a considerable town before the Roman invasion. Its Celtic name was Lyndin (lake fort). Tacitus, in the first century, calls it Londinium and describes it as a flourishing place. The earliest notice of Paris is in "Caesar's Commentaries." Caesar called it Lutetia and described it as a collection of mud flats. Lutetia began in the fourth century to be known as Parisia, or Paris, and in the sixth century was selected by Clovis as the seat of government. Of the two cities London is undoubtedly the more ancient, though how much older it is impossible to say.
