Mr. Roumillat showed the reporter one of his cabinets on Tuesday. It is intended to set on a table in the kitchen. The cabinet is made of galvanized iron, japanned and enameled. It has apartments for bread, meats, pies; holds 25 pounds of flour, 65 pounds of cornmeal or buckwheat 25 pounds of sugar, 20 pounds of rice, 3 pounds of coffee in the berry, with a grinder in convenient place; 3 pounds of tea; has six or eight spice cans, a pair of scales, mirrors, etc. The grocer is one of the neatest and most convenient pieces of kitchen furniture the writer ever saw. As a rule, we have conveniences in the office, in the store, in the work shop and wherever a man works, but allow the ladies to get along at home with the most crude articles, and few conveniences. Mr. Roumillat has already taken orders for a number of the cabinets in DeLand; he placed about 250 of them in Sanford and Apopka.
