S. U.—U. of F. Game

In Jacksonville

THE contest on the checker board at the driving park last week, between Stetson and Lake City, was an interesting and a peculiar one. The two halves were as different in general aspect and results as could well be imagined. In the first half the two phenomenal features were, Stetson's magnificent hammering of opponents' line for an unbroken gain of 80 yards in 17 minutes, and U. of F.'s spectacular end run of 65 yards. Total ground gained by kicks, 1st half, S. U., 108 yards; U. of F., 60 yards, or an average of 42 yards per kick for our splendid full-back, Cox, as against 20 yards per kick for Lake City. In second-half Stetson kicked 110 yards, an average of 22 per kick, while Lake City gave up in despair, resolving to trust to her end runs for ground gaining; not once did she attempt to score by kicks in 2d half. Counting the 65-yard end run of Lake City, her gains by rushes, were, 1st half, 145 yards; 2d half, 93 yards; Stetson, 1st half, 110 yards, and only 19 yards in 2d half, or total ground gained by rushes: Stetson, 129 yards; Lake City, 238 yards.

Total ground gained by kicks and rushes was, Stetson, first half, 278 yards; U. of F., 205 yards; 2d half, Stetson, 129 yards; U. of F., 153 yards; total, Stetson, 407 yards; U. of F., 358. In the second half the ball was kept in U. of F.'s territory fully 4-5 of the time, being carried towards the center of the field but twice in the entire half, and as speedily carried back by Stetson; in the first half the ball was in each territory about equally. Stetson fumbled the ball 6 times; Lake City, 10 times. These figures on fumbles are very large and point to need of more careful work at critical moments.

Stetson lost ball on downs in first half, once; Lake City, once; in 2d half Lake City lost ball on downs 4 times; Stetson not once; total, Lake City lost ball on downs 5 times, Stetson, once. This shows clearly that our line was holding steadily better all the time, and Lake City losing in this particular. In fact, all the means our opponents had for gaining ground were long sweeping end runs, while Stetson could gain by kicks as well as line-backs or short end runs. Our line was at no time so riddled and shattered as was Lake City in the entire game, especially in the first half. Stetson men were outweighed 10 pounds to a man, and won the game, not by "mere luck," as some of the press correspondents would make us believe, but by having a more all-round playing team, and superior generalship. Every man on Stetson team as well as on Lake City's team, played for all that was in him; the game was as hard fought a battle as any ever played in the state. Our boys feel well pleased, on the whole, with the showing made Nov. 6th, 1903.

Mr. Humphries of Jacksonville was the referee, and was never more alert, quick to decide, was fair in judgment, than at this game; no objections could be made to his ruling at any point. He has won many warm friends in DeLand by his impartial decisions. Among the large number of former Stetson students that cheered the white and green on to victory were: Miss Annie Rawls, Miss Fletcher, Miss Mary Gray, the Misses Pope, Miss Sadie Race, Miss Carp; Messrs. Fielding, Pope, Colyer, Merrow, Merrill, Pickler, Winter, Stripling, Walker and Geo. Fox.

The next game for the cup will probably be, so far as Stetson is concerned, the Thanksgiving Day game here against the Florida College. EDW. G. BALDWIN.

SHOT AFTER COLLISION.

Bicycle Mix-Up Near Boynton Results in a Shooting Affray.

Late Monday evening on the public road near Boynton Eli Campbell was shot and seriously wounded by Bert Freeman as a result of a bicycle collision. As soon as possible the wounded man was removed to a house near by and medical attention was secured. The wound is a serious one, but at last accounts it was hoped it would not prove fatal.

Mr. Freeman was arraigned before Justice Forrey at Boynton, waived examination and gave bond in the sum of \$2,000. The state was represented by Mr. Robert R. Taylor and the defence by Col. G. A. Worley. No testimony has yet been taken and at this writing it is impossible to give a correct account of the causes which resulted in the shooting. Mr. Campbell is from the west coast and was preparing to put in a crop at Boynton. Mr. Freeman is one of the Freeman Brothers who are building the county rock road between Boynton and Delray. He is an extensive tomato grower and is well known from Little River to Cutler.

Circuit Court

CIRCUIT COURT met on Monday, Judge Minor S. Jones presiding. It was undoubtedly the shortest session of court ever held in Volusia county. There were only nine cases on the docket, one of which was tried, one remanded, and the other seven continued for the term. In the case of R. H. Plant versus J. A. Clements, suit on a note, the defendant failed to appear, and the jury rendered judgment in the sum of \$215. This was the only case given to the jury. The jury was sworn in the case of Minshew & Carter versus E. E. Ropes, and afterwards the plaintiff asked leave to amend the declaration, which motion was granted and the case remanded to rules. John H. Pope of Jacksonville made application for admission to the bar. Attorneys Bert Fish and E. Bly were appointed to examine the applicant, who was afterwards subjected to examination in open court. Mr. Pope stood a most satisfactory examination and was admitted. Court adjourned Wednesday morning.
