Library Board and the Missionary Union Were in Session Thursday Afternoon, March 25th.

On last Thursday afternoon was a busy time at the Public Library. At 3 p. m. the Library Board met in the reception room with Rev. R. V. Atkisson the president of the Library Association in the chair. A quorum being present the usual monthly business was transacted. There has been a steady advance in the work of the library during the year. There should be a hearty co-operation of the people of Live Oak with the good women and men who are looking after this growing enterprise. The children are patronizing the library faithfully. Let every public spirited citizen do something to further this noble work.

The Board adjourned to the Library room and took part in the city Mission-

ary Union's reception. This helpful and beautiful custom of our ladies, who are engaged in missionary work in the Methodist, Baptist, Advent and Presbyterian churches, of meeting together every three months and making reports, and discussing practical local subjects is to be heartily commended.

The theme at this meeting was: "Reading and its Effect on the Individual." Dr. Atkisson led off in a discussion of the subject with a fifteen minutes practical talk that was much enjoyed. Revs. Ford and Lee followed with short talks and Rev. Wray by request gave a splendid recitation. The exercises were followed by Mrs. Geo. Nelson, State Organizer of the W. C. T. U. with a talk on the work of this world-wide order. A local W. C. T. U. was organized, but it was contended by those best acquainted with the conditions in Live Oak, that the entire city Missionary Union is as one body a

W. C. T. U. organization when the occasion may demand it. This large body of good women may be counted on to do temperance work at any time.

A committee was appointed by Mrs. J. J. Jones, the president of the Union, to aid the county commissioners in improving the sanitary condition of the jail. This committee consists of the pastors of the four churches represented in the Union with Dr. Atkisson as the chairman and Mrs. H. M. Johnson, Mrs. O. O. Williams and Mrs. Rouse were added to see that the duty was well done.

Refreshments were served and enjoyed greatly. The musical program was shortened because of the great amount of business. The Union adjourned to its regular meeting.

Paper Mill Will Be Built.

All Gainesville will hail with delight the news that the paper mill proposed and talked of for some time past will finally be perfected.

The Sun reporter called upon B. F. Williamson Saturday and he gave out this gratifying news, and while he would have liked to have gone into the matter more fully, the urgent business matters that he is now looking after required his attention and it is impossible to stop at this particular time.

He stated that the matter would necessarily be delayed owing to the death of its great promoter, but that the business had assumed such proportions that it would not and could not be dropped at this stage for the mere want of attention.

The organization for the proposed mill had practically been completed, and at the time of Mr. Chase's death plans were working that would have brought results within a few months.

Just how long the matter will be delayed could not be stated, but Mr. Williamson, who has all along managed the work of making the paper and planning for this part of the business, will be able to give the citizens and the public some definite information regarding same within a short while.

Plans for the erection of the building, plant and houses have all about been completed, and the edition of The Sun which is to appear on that paper made from this process will give the illustrations within the near future.—Gainesville Sun.

DEPUTY SHERIFF'S AWFUL FATE

Roasted Alive Under a Burning Automobile Near West Palm Beach.

West Palm Beach, Fla., March 27.—James Abrams, a former employee of the Florida East Coast hotel system at Palm Beach, met a horrible death shortly after midnight this morning. With Mr. Abrams were George C. Barco and Richard Gardner, hurrying in an automobile from Boynton to West Palm Beach. Soon after leaving Boynton and while running at a fast rate of speed, something went wrong with the steering gear caused by the encroaching bushes on the roadway. In an instant the big machine ran into a ditch, turning turtle and pinning the three men beneath. Soon the leaking gasoline caught fire but not before Gardner managed to extricate himself. He finally released Barco after the latter had received terrible burns but Abrams was so tightly held that rescue was impossible and Gardner and Barco were forced to stand by and see their companion slowly burn to death.

Abrams, who was a deputy sheriff of Dade county, leaves a wife and several small children.
