

STONEWALL JACKSON'S SISTER

Up in Ohio Talks of the Famous General.

Columbus, O., March 3.—Mrs. Laura Jackson Arnold, sister of Stonewall Jackson, celebrated her eighty-third birthday Sunday by taking a mile walk and receiving her friends, to whom she told some interesting recollections of her noted brother. The home of the Jacksons was at Clarksburg, Harrison county, Virginia, but she came to Columbus soon after the close of the Civil War for rest and recuperation, and for the last twenty-nine years has lived here. Her husband is dead and they had only one child—a son now in business in the South.

"I am the only surviving child of Jonathan Jackson," said Mrs. Arnold. "There were three of us—Thomas (Stonewall,) Warren and myself. Some biographies of Stonewall Jackson state that he was taken when quite young and reared by an uncle. That is a mistake. It was Warren who was taken by an uncle—or rather kept by him until he ran away and became a cabin boy on an Ohio river steamer. But Tom remained at home with me and my earliest recollection of him is of being tied with him to a bed post in our home to prevent us from getting into the fire. Tom was two years older than I was, but that did not prevent him from playing with dolls with me as we were thus held in captivity.

"My recollections of him as a man is that he was of a serious, conscientious and religious nature. He was studious from childhood and very thorough in all that he did. I am sure that if he had lived he would have succeeded in whatever he undertook."

Work for the Legislature.

We trust that the members of the legislature will not waste all their time in dividing counties, wrangling over special charters for towns and cities and in formulating memorials to congress, but will put in a little of their time in the enactment of laws for the benefit of the laboring and industrial classes. We need legislation to regulate the rates and service of the express companies. These companies should be prohibited from doing business in this State, or the Railroad Commission should be given absolute control of them as to rates and service.

Our license law is nothing in the world but a legalized robbery of the laboring classes. There is no sounder proposition on earth than, the property of the country should bear the burdens

of the country, but this infamous license law levies tribute on the labor of the country in a manner both unjust and tyrannical.

Our pension law is inequitable and unjust. Pensions of at least \$15.00 a month should be given to every worn-out, needy Confederate soldier, or the widow of a Confederate soldier—and this our people will give gladly—but to tax poor men and poverty smitten widows to pension the wealthy and well to do, is unjust and a shame and an outrage. Presidents of banks worth a million dollars are today on our pension roll and it is a shame to them, a disgrace to the State and an injustice to every taxpayer in our commonwealth.

Another law needed is one to require all who take what is called a Retainer Title note, to have them duly recorded in the office of the clerk of the circuit court and to impose a penalty for trading property, for which such notes were given, without written notice and the written acknowledgement of such notice from the purchaser. We will not waste space in giving the reasons, for they must be apparent to any man who has sense enough to serve in the capacity of a legislator.

Attend to some of these practical matters, legislators, in which all the people are vitally interested and when you return home, at the close of the session, the people will rise up and call you blessed.—Jasper News.

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FLORIDA LEGISLATURE

MET IN REGULAR SESSION LAST TUESDAY AT TALLAHASSEE.

BOTH HOUSES ARE ORGANIZED

Farris of Duval Speaker of House and Hudson of Miami President of Senate.

Tallahassee, April 5.—After a spectacular fight in which every inch of ground was vigorously contested, Ion L. Farris of Duval county was nominated for speaker of the house of representatives at the caucus tonight over Alexander of Volusia and Roberson of Suwannee county, MacWilliams of St. Johns and Carter of Alachua having retired from the race.

The house caucus was called at 8:05 p. m. Calkins, of Nassau, nominated Farris, Duval, for speaker; Thornton, of Volusia, nominated Alexander, of Volusia, and Davis, of Madison, nominated Roberson, of Suwannee. The vote was as follows: Farris, 39; Alexander, 13; Roberson, 16.

J. G. Kellum was unanimously nominated for chief clerk.

Charles Q. Rivers of Columbia was defeated by J. C. Maires for nomination of assistant chief clerk.

George B. Dickinson of Orange was nominated for bill clerk.

Nat R. Walker received the nomination for reading clerk by acclamation. Morris Michelson, over W. B. James, for assistant reading clerk.

For engrossing clerk, Dr. York was nominated by acclamation.

For enrolling clerk, C. M. Brown and B. F. Umstead were nominated. The former won by a vote of 40 to 28.

For recording clerk, R. A. Gray was nominated by acclamation.

Victor Lewillin, messenger; George E. Hawkins, sergeant at arms; J. W. Allen door keeper; Rev. J. R. Taylor, chaplain.

Senate Caucus.

The caucus was called at 8 o'clock p. m. Frederick M. Hudson, of the 13th district was nominated president of the senate over J. H. Humphries of the 27th district by a vote of 20 to 11.

Legislature Organized.

Tallahassee, April 6.—Both branches of the legislature of 1909 were called to order at 12 o'clock today and were formally organized for the work of the session.

In the house of representatives the names of the nominees of the democratic caucus of last night were presented by Representative Hillburn, of Putman county, while in the senate the names of the caucus nominees were presented by Senator McMullen, of Tampa.

The governor's message was received and read in each house. The real work of the session will not begin until President Hudson and Speaker Farris announce the committee assignments of the house and senate. These officers are expected to finish this work before the end of the week.
