

A Paramount Necessity.

The Bible says there are three cardinal virtues—faith, hope, and love, and the greatest of these is love.

Now, there are three things of prime importance and necessary to the growth and well-being of our city. They are (1) good streets, (2) good water, and (3) good sewerage.

As to the first, we are progressing as well as might be expected with the paving of our streets.

As to our water, I have already written an article, published in the Democrat a few weeks ago, expressing my views on this subject.

I believe, as do most of our citizens, that we should have our city supplied with the wholesome and healthful water of Suwannee Springs, a water of known purity and of recognized therapeutic value.

It is not intended by this article on "better water" to infer that our present supply is infected. The Suwannee Springs water is better, and it is simply to urge upon our people to take advantage of this opportunity to have our city supplied with a better water. The writer feels that we should be absolutely protected against infection of our water, not only at the present, but during all future time, and the advertisement which our town would receive from this source would more than pay for the cost of putting this water in within two years' time after it is done.

As to the last, good sewerage, I would say, as did the Apostle Paul in classifying the three cardinal virtues, it is the most important. A good system of sewerage would not only be of great benefit and protection against all possible infection or contamination of our city water, but would also insure our country friends against contamination of their drinking water, most of whom have bored wells of about the same depth as the drainage or sewerage wells now in use in our city. We do not know where our sewerage goes after it enters our drainage wells. Instances might be mentioned of positive proof as to the dangers and damage done in other places by the drainage-well system, both to the town in which the wells were located and in the surrounding country, as well as in adjoining towns as far as thirty miles away.

This is one of the best agricultural counties in the state. Statistical reports, as filed at the state capital, show the money value of our crops to exceed that of any other county in the state. This fact indicates two things: (1), that we have good land and (2), that we have good men to cultivate it. In an agricultural way our town is well supported, and we are proud of the thrift and industry of our farmers. It is largely through their votes and their money that Live Oak, the capital city of the county, has such a fine court house—the handsomest structure that adorns our city. Do we not feel grateful to our friends in the country for their part in helping us to build this court house? Certainly we do! Then, let us express our gratitude in some material way.

This leads me to say that some of our friends in the country, especially to the south of us, who have had much fever in their families, feel that this sickness is largely due to pollution or contamination of their drinking water by our drainage wells. Let us apply the golden rule of love and relieve them of this fear if not of an actual condition. We can do this only by putting in a good sewerage system. Furthermore, there are certain quarters in our own town that are in an unsanitary condition, and must ever remain so, till we have the proper sewerage to carry off the filth.

There are but few places as large as this that do not have a sewerage system. Why should we lag behind?

The next question is: How will we get this sewerage? (Answer): By making our wants known to the proper officials in an earnest and serious manner.

It will take some money to sewer our city, and I don't blame our city council or bond trustees for not going ahead on their own initiative and having this work done. The people must ask for it first, and show that they are willing for our councilmen to spend the necessary money.

Those who know the personnel of our city council, will agree with me in saying that they are progressive business men of ability and integrity, and that they have served us well, and have never turned a deaf ear to the requests of our people upon any question in which a majority of our people stood united, nor will they do so in this case.

Now, if we need the sewerage, (and I think that we are all agreed that we do), and want it, and want it bad enough to be willing to pay the interest

on a few thousand dollars of bonds to get it, let us go with a united front and ask the city council to put it in.

If the residents of this city will make known their wishes on this subject by writing me a card or letter, I will present same to our city council.

Let the ladies express themselves as well as the men. It is a matter that concerns all, and in which all have an equal right.

Lest undue apprehension should be aroused by writing upon this subject, I wish to say that, after having had the experience of living in three different states, this is the most healthful town that I have yet lived in. Contagious diseases, such as typhoid fever, scarlet fever and pneumonia are usually less virulent here than in other places, the death rate being much lower.

Naturally, Live Oak is a very healthful location; our boys and girls, our men and women, are strong and robust.

If I may refer to our medical fraternity without including myself, I wish to say that this city is fortunate in having an unusually strong corps of physicians. They are practical and they are men who devote themselves to the study and practice of their profession.

Of course our lower death rate must be attributed to the unusual skill and ability of our physicians, as well as to the healthfulness of our climate and location—a splendid combination for any town. Respectfully,

Florida Soils.

Perhaps the most attractive feature peculiar to the soils of Florida is the ease with which they can be cultivated as compared with stiff, heavy soils of other states, while quite as fertile. Another is that the greater part of the farm labor and tillage can be, and much of it is, performed during those months of the year when the ground further north is frozen. Still another peculiarity is, that fertilizers can be applied to greater advantage, because the fertilizing material will remain in the soil until the stimulating chemical ingredients are assimilated and absorbed into the earth, and are not carried away by washing rains as they are in broken or mountainous countries, and also because the porosity of the soil enables the atmosphere, through oxidation, more readily to aid the fertilizers in the work of decomposing the minerals of the soil, thus setting free the food elements they contain for the use of the growing crops.—Florida Quarterly Bulletin.
