ORDINANCE No. 56.

An Ordinance to amend Sections 1, 2 and 7 of Ordinance No. 16 of the City of Live Oak, Florida, being an Ordinance entitled "An ordinance to prohibit the running at large on the streets of the City of Live Oak, of horses, mules, hogs and goats, and to provide for the impounding and disposing of the same," passed September 30th, 1903, and approved October 6th, 1903.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Live Oak, Florida: Section 1a. That Section 1, Section 2 and Section 7 of Ordinance No. 16 of the City of Live Oak, Florida, being an ordinance entitled "An ordinance to prohibit the running at large on the streets of the City of Live Oak, of horses, mules, hogs and goats, and to provide for the impounding and disposing of the

same," approved October 6, 1903, be and the same are hereby amended so as to read as follows: "Section 1. Horses, mules, hogs and goats shall not be allowed to run at large upon any of the streets, alleys, lanes or unenclosed property of the City of Live Oak, and that cows shall not be allowed to run at large upon any of the streets, lanes or public highways of the said City, or other unenclosed premises, within the following boundary in said City of Live Oak, Florida, to-wit: Beginning at a point where Irvin and First streets intersect, and running south to where Irvin and Carroll streets intersect, thence east to Houston street, thence south along Houston street to John street, thence east on John street to Church street, thence south on Church street to corporation line, thence east on corporation line to White street, thence north on White street to Howard street, thence east on Howard street to a point opposite Georgia avenue, thence north to and along Georgia avenue to the northeast corner of Bryson street and Georgia avenue, thence due north along section line to a point opposite Fifth street, thence west to and along Fifth street to Atlantic Coast Line railroad, thence southwest across Atlantic Coast Line railroad to First street, thence west along First street to point of beginning."

"Section II. It shall be the duty of the City Marshal or any deputy Marshal or policeman of the said City to take possession of and place in a pound to be provided for that purpose any horse, mule, hog or goat found by him or them running at large upon any of the streets, alleys, highways or other unenclosed property within said City, and likewise take possession of and place in said pound any cow found by him or them running at large on any of the streets, alleys, lanes, public highways or other unenclosed property of said City of Live Oak within the boundaries prescribed in Section I hereof."

"Section VII. For catching and impounding stock under this ordinance, the City Marshal shall be entitled to the following fees, namely: For catching and impounding horses, mules and cows fifty cents per head, goats thirty cents per head, hogs one dollar per head. For feeding and taking care of such stock while in pound for horses, mules and cows he shall receive forty cents per day per head each, for hogs or goats ten cents per day per head each; for advertising and selling such animals he shall receive the sum of fifty cents for horses, mules or cows per head, and for hogs or goats the sum of twenty-five cents per head each. The word "hog" under this ordinance shall be taken to include "pigs."

Section IIa. That this Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its passage by the Council and approval by the Mayor as to mules, horses, goats and hogs, but shall not go into effect as to cows until 60 days from its passage by the City Council.
