To Investigate Internal Improvement Board—Open Session Will Be Held.

Tallahassee, June 24.—The committee created by the legislature to continue the investigation of the acts of the trustees of the Internal Improvement Fund from the beginning of the trust to the present time, met and organized this afternoon. The committee consists of Senators Trammel, Cone, Leggett; Representatives Reese, Carter, Knight and Matthews. Organization of the committee was completed by choosing Mr. Carter as chairman, Mr. Reese as vice chairman and Mr. Trammel as secretary. Expert accountants will arrive tonight and work will begin Tuesday morning. All sessions will be open and all persons with charges against the trustees will have an opportunity to be heard. It is the intention of the committee to thoroughly investigate all official acts from the beginning of the trust.

Hot Time in Newberry Jail.

Because Tom Williams, a negro who was in the Newberry jail upon a charge of assault with intent to murder, tried to burn his way out of prison, he was himself severely burned without accomplishing his purpose, as the fire was discovered in time to save the building. Williams, however, was in the thickest of the flames, being confined in the cell where he started the fire. He will now languish in the county jail here, having been brought to this city Saturday by Constable J. D. Siford. Williams will now have to face two charges, that of which he was arrested, and arson, which is a serious crime in this State, being a capital crime. Fortunately the flames were discovered in time to prevent the escape of the prisoner and save the building.

Land Sold at Auction.

There was a lively scene in the United States land office in this city a day or two recently, which resembled for a time a stock exchange on a miniature scale, so far as excitement was concerned. The occasion of this commotion was an auction sale of right to enter a tract of 240 acres of land on Gasparilla Island, in Charlotte Harbor, near Punta Gorda, which has been but recently surveyed and opened up by the United States Government. Hon. Henry S. Chubb, register, proved himself upon this occasion an apt auctioneer, and succeeded in getting a good bid. They were in the neighborhood of fifteen bidders, and the right was

knocked down to Hon. John P. Vall of Tampa, representing James M. Gifford of New York. Col. Wall's bid varied from \$1.25 to \$2.75 per acre, according to the nature of the soil. This does not give the bidder possession of the land, but merely the first opportunity to file entry papers. This land is of a diversified nature, and is valued at \$100 per acre.
