The Capital.

It is not generally known, says the Philadelphia Record, but it is a fact of history nevertheless that Bristol township, lying on the east side of Germantown, had a very narrow escape from being selected as the site of the capital of the United States. So positive were some members of congress that the capital was going to be located near Germantown that they purchased real estate there, not, of course, as a matter of speculation, but simply to be near at hand when the removal from Philadelphia to Bristol took place. When the vote of the commissioners was taken there was a tie, four being for Bristol and four for the District of Columbia. Washington cast the deciding vote, and Bristol township was left out in the cold.
