RESOLUTION ADOPTED BY BOARD OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION.

Regarding Popash School Dist. Bonds.

Whereas, A petition has been filed in and for DeSoto County, by the residents of Popash Special District No. 4, petitioning said Board of Public Instruction to call an election of the qualified electors of said Special Tax School District for the purpose of deciding whether the said Special Tax School District shall issue bonds in the sum of Eight Thousand and (\$8,000) dollars, six thousand (\$6,000) dollars of this amount is to be used for the purpose of acquiring school grounds, building, equipping and furnishing the school house at Charlotte Harbor, and improving the grounds of said school. The remaining Two Thousand (\$2,000) dollars is to be used for the purpose of erecting, equipping and furnishing a school building at Murdock, enclosing and improving the school grounds and other purposes strictly incident and pertaining to the establishment and maintenance of a Junior High School in said Special Tax School District; said bonds to draw interest at the rate of six (6) per cent per annum, payable either in thirty (30) years from date of said issue or in installments at stated intervals during said thirty years. Regarding Charlotte Harbor School District Bonds.

Whereas, A petition has been filed in and for DeSoto County, by the residents of Charlotte Harbor Special Tax School District No. 34, petitioning said Board of Public Instruction to call an election of the qualified electors of said Special Tax School District for the purpose of deciding whether the said Special Tax School District shall issue bonds in the sum of Eight Thousand and (\$8,000) dollars, six thousand (\$6,000) dollars of this amount is to be used for the purpose of acquiring school grounds, building, equipping and furnishing the school house at Charlotte Harbor, and improving the grounds of said school. SOME SCRAP LAST NIGHT ON THE BOWERY.

Quite a little flurry of excitement marred the tranquility of West Magnolia street last evening.

A gentleman passing along the street noticed two men carry another man from the Atlantic Restaurant and deposit the apparently lifeless body in the alley to the rear of the building. The observer, thinking the actions of the two men carrying the body were a bit out of the ordinary, his suspicions were aroused, and he went for an officer. The matter and found a man lying in the alley in a senseless condition, and with a wound on his right temple that had bled profusely. The wounded one was George Fox, who it appears had gone into the restaurant pretty well "soused."

The proprietor of the restaurant, George Andress, a Greek, was entirely absent, and could not be found, but one of his employees, also a Greek, saved enough United States to explain that the disabled person had entered the place intoxicated, and that he had fallen out of a chair and hurt himself. The officers thought the story rather thin, and took the Greek to jail, protesting his innocence in the language of several continents.

Mr. Fox was attended to by physicians and was also put in confinement, and this morning he was wide awake and sufficiently recovered for a further investigation. George was found and his honor of the city lid, after weighing the evidence presented, fined George and Mr. Fox the sum of twenty-five dollars each.

DEATH OF INFANT SON OF MR. AND MRS. C. L. STEELE.

The infant son of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Steele died Wednesday afternoon. The little one was nine months old, and it had been ill for several days with stomach trouble.

The funeral service was held at the residence of Mr. Steele this afternoon at 1 o'clock, and the service was conducted by Rev. J. W. Vesey, pastor of the Baptist church. The interment was made immediately thereafter in the Oak Ridge cemetery.

The funeral was largely attended, and many beautiful floral tributes were sent to the little loved one.

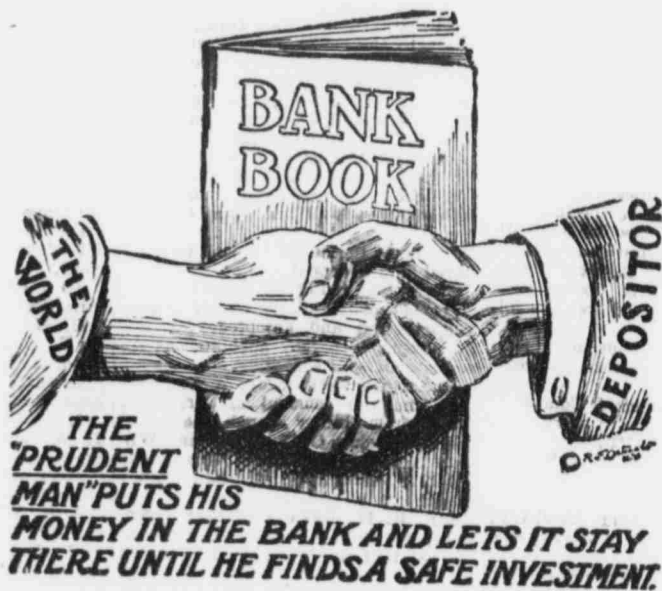
