INJUNCTION SUIT FILED.

Treadwell & Treadwell, acting for their client, P. O. Rickman, filed the following bill on Monday, April 10th: P. O. Rickman vs. L. W. Whitehurst, L. D. Skipper, W. G. Welles, John Hagan, William Whitten, commissioners of DeSoto county, and A. B. Tucker, H. R. Driggers and C. M. Carrier, bond trustees of the Punta Gorda Special Road and Bridge District. The bill was filed to enjoin the county commissioners and bond trustees from proceeding under the present plan of hiring day labor in the Punta Gorda special road and bridge district.

In the bill for injunction the complainant states that the Punta Gorda Special Road and Bridge District was incorporated under chapter 6208, laws of Florida of 1911, which provides that in case bonds are voted in a special road and bridge district, and as soon as they are sold, the commissioners shall as soon as they deem it expedient, let the contract for the improvements to the lowest bidder. It is alleged that the commissioners have never let a contract, but have allowed the bond trustees to hire day labor in carrying out the improvements. This alleged act of the county commissioners is provided for in chapter 7062 of the sessions, law of the state of Florida of 1915, which is as follows:

An act to empower the board of county commissioners of DeSoto county to make changes in the roads and number of improving same in the Punta Gorda Special Road and Bridge District.

Be it enacted by the legislature of the State of Florida, Section 1. That the board of county commissioners of DeSoto county be authorized to make such changes in the construction of the roads in the Punta Gorda Special Road and Bridge District as the bond trustees of said district shall unanimously ask to be made, and that when the board of county commissioners and the bond trustees are unanimously of the opinion that the work can be done to the best advantage by day labor, the county commissioners may direct that the work be done in that manner.

The complainant contends that as the Punta Gorda special road and bridge district was created under chapter 6208 of the laws of 1911, the work now being done in that district is being done illegally. The bill for injunction will be heard by Judge Whitney Wednesday, April 19th.
