MR. G. M. ALLEN.

The funeral services over the remains of Mr. G. M. Allen, one of Arcadia's oldest and best known citizens, was preached this afternoon at the home of Mrs. Jennie Bean, on Polk avenue, by Dr. Charles T. Alexander, the pastor of the Baptist church.

Mr. Allen had been quite ill for a period of ten days, and owing to his extreme age, nearly 82 years, the best of medical care failed to restore him.

No citizen of Arcadia was more highly respected than Mr. Allen, and the beautiful floral offerings and other evidences of esteem but faintly showed the love of the people for him.

Mr. Allen served throughout the entire four years of the civil war, being under the command of General McNeal, of Virginia. He never married, but as has been well said of him, he was a father to the younger members of the family, and it was through his instrumentality that his sister, Mrs. Jennie Bean, so well known for her good works in this city and county, was able to obtain the benefits of a good home and good education.

Mr. Allen was born in Alabama, in 1835, and lived in that state until he was sixty-seven years of age. He then moved to Live Oak, in the northern part of this state, where he resided for a period of two years. The remainder of his life has been spent in southern Florida, he having resided in Arcadia for the past thirteen years.

Mr. Allen joined the Baptist church about thirty years ago, and he has lived a conscientious, Christian life since that time.

The pall bearers were: J. L. Jones, Charlie Roe, G. P. Lamb, J. T. Kelley, R. E. Nowling and Mr. DeVane. Surviving Mr. Allen are four brothers and one sister, Mrs. Jennie Bean, Mr. A. D. Allen, of this city, and Messrs. William H. Allen, John Y. Allen and Julius H. Allen, of Woodstock, Alabama.
